Continued from Page 1, Section 1 growers that at least 75% of the allotment established for their farm should be planted in order to maintain their present history acreage. If cotton is planted and was a failure, this should be reported to the performance reporter at the time he visits the farm for measuring purposes.

At least 5% of the tobacco farms in the county will be checked by ASC Tobacco Variety Identification Specialists to identify the tobacco as to acceptable or discount variety.

Farmers should be sure the plants that they are setting out are acceptable varieties.

During measuring time when a farm is visited each grower will be asked to certify as to whether any discounted varieties are being grown.
