Chowan County Commissioners at their July meeting held Monday morning gave their final glance at the budget for the fiscal year 1963-64 and adopted it as presented at a previous meeting. The tax rate will remain the same as last year, \$1.58 with an added 10-cent levy for rural fire protection outside the Town of Edenton.

The overall budget calls for anticipated expenditures of \$595,-926.92 and includes some increases in the various departments of the county government. Commssioners, however, were able to meet with the various increases without boosting the budget. The tax levy of \$1.58 per \$100 property valuation is based on a property valuation in the county of \$21,-
