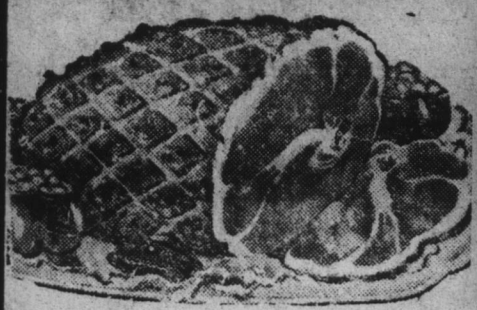
The various committees met and made resolutions to be carried out during the year by the association.

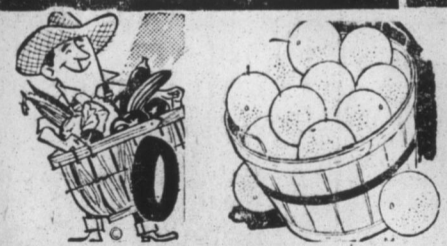
