

## Ware To Celebrate First Anniversary

### Membership Increased From 17 to Over 100 Members

Next Sunday will mark the end of the first anniversary of the Rev. Bob Ware in the pastorate of Immanuel Baptist Church. Mr. Ware, who was an evangelist for several years before coming to the Edenton church, came when the church was still a mission under the mother church, Emmanuel Baptist in Elizabeth City.

Since Mr. Ware has been full time pastor of the assembly, the congregation has grown from a mere handful of about 17 members to a total of well over 100 in attendance at every service. The assembly formally became a church in June of last year.

During the year the church has begun giving partial support to two mission projects. Money is given to the Rev. Lindsay Harrell in Brazil each month and to Hermon Harrell, Bible student at Virginia Bible College, toward his training there.

"Voice of the Bible" is a daily radio broadcast by the pastor and is a very vital branch of the church ministry. Mail response has been tremendous and there have been many reports of decisions for Christ through it. It is especially valuable in reaching the invalids and elderly citizens of the area.

In the past year, one man, Hermon Harrell, has been licensed to preach by the church. Also, the church's first board of deacons has been ordained.

The church maintains a bus ministry and gives free transportation to many of its members and visitors.

Youth meetings have been started each Saturday night at the church for the teenagers of the city. Good News Clubs have been conducted in various parts of the city by ladies of the congregation. The first vacation Bible School in the short history of the assembly was held last June.

Ground has been donated to the church by an Edentonian though there are a few legal matters to be settled before it is official.

Future plans include a building to be built near the outskirts of town as a permanent meeting place for the congregation.

At least four of the outstanding speakers from across America have been engaged to hold revivals between now and the fall.

Plans are already under way for a Vacation Bible School in June.

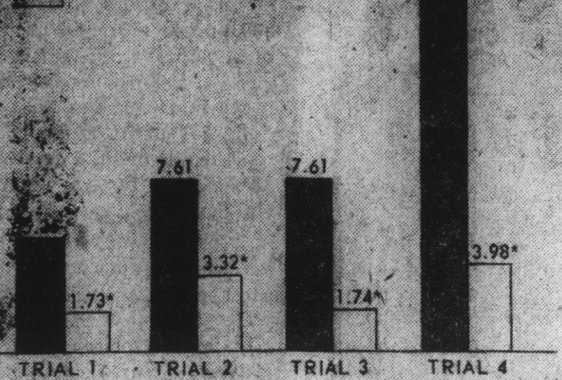

Your chance of remaining well during the cold winter months ahead may be increased if you take certain simple precautions now.

With the onset of winter, the commonest causes of illness are various respiratory infections. Of these, influenza is undoubtedly most important. It breaks out in epidemic form about every two or three years, affecting large numbers of individuals within a short time. It is a more serious disease when it occurs in the middle-aged and older groups and in pregnant women. Influenza takes its greatest toll among those who are chronically ill with such debilitating diseases as high blood pressure, rheumatic heart disease, asthma, bronchitis, tuberculosis, and hardening of the arteries.

The health hazard from flu has in the past been lessened by a simple immunization program. Vaccination now is recommended as a useful precaution, and, if the virus does not change, should provide protection for a significant number of individuals.

## 112 Given Old Age Aid During January

Mrs. J. H. McMullan, superintendent of public welfare, reports that during January 112 persons received old age assistance with \$5,033 being distributed. There were 39 cases of aid to dependent children, who received \$2,972. Forty-six cases of permanently and totally disabled received \$2,468 and \$471 went to 12 cases of aid to the blind.

Thirteen cases receiving assistance amounted to \$289.30. Eight cases were hospitalized in the

county costing \$1,120, of which the county's part was \$700. Six cases were hospitalized outside the county costing \$111.60.
