"Jesus, when he had cried again with a loud voice, yielded up the ghost. And, behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom." (Matthew 27:50-51).

In the temple in Jerusalem was a room called the "Holy of Holies" or the "holiest of all". To the Jews of long ago the presence of God Himself was supposed to be in that room. No one was allowed to enter except the high priest who could enter once each year with the blood of atonement which he sprinkled upon and before the mercy-seat seven times" (Lev. 16:14). 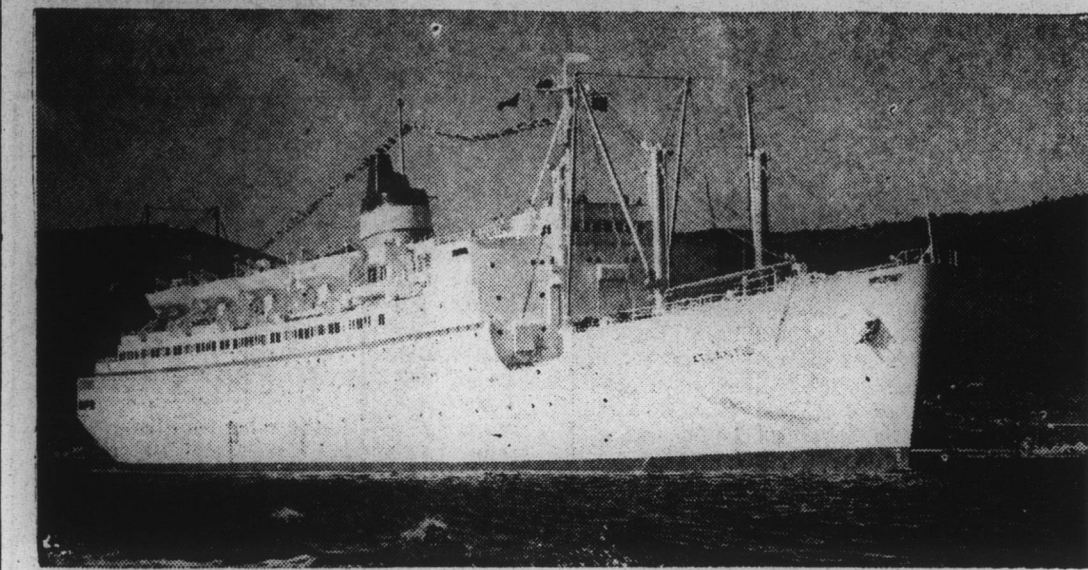

On motion of J. Clarence Leary, seconded by T. O. Asbell and duly carried that Dallas Jethro, Jr., be appointed a member of County Extension Advisory Board.

On motion made, seconded and duly carried, that Clerk of Superior Court be allowed to attend the Clerk of Courts' Conference July 1, 2, 3 and 4 and the Sheriff be allowed to attend Sheriffs' Convention July 9, 10 and 11. The County Commissioners will pay all expenses of convention or conference for Clerk Superior Court, Sheriff and Register of Deeds every two years or one half expense every year if they plan to attend, beginning this year.
