He was graduated from State Teachers College in Elizabeth City in 1963, having previously attended the D. F. Walker High School.

Admission to the Signal School is limited to men of outstanding promise. Classed as a technical institute, the school gives training chiefly in the operation, maintenance, and repair of forty different types of electronic equipment, from radio and television sets to "electronic brains". 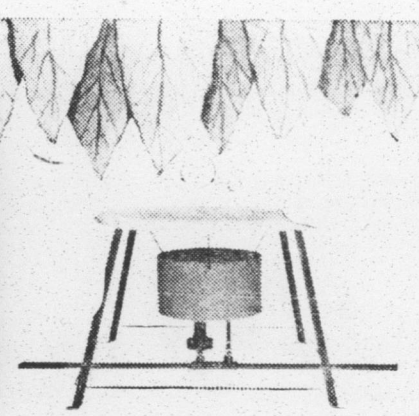
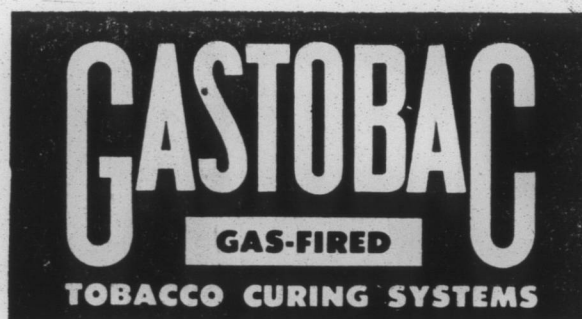
