Meeting in special session Thursday night, Town Council adopted an ordinance which has for its purpose the establish- Dr. Isa Grant Points ment of personnel rules and regulations for employees of the Town of Edenton. Every now and then, over a period of about five years, the idea bobbed up to establish an equitable and uniform system in personnel administration, but no definite action was taken. Lately, however. Councilman Luther Parks, who was assigned to the task of submitting a proposed plan, contacted various towns and the Institute of Government and on Thursday night presented the proposed ordinance which, with a few minor changes, was unanimously adopted.


