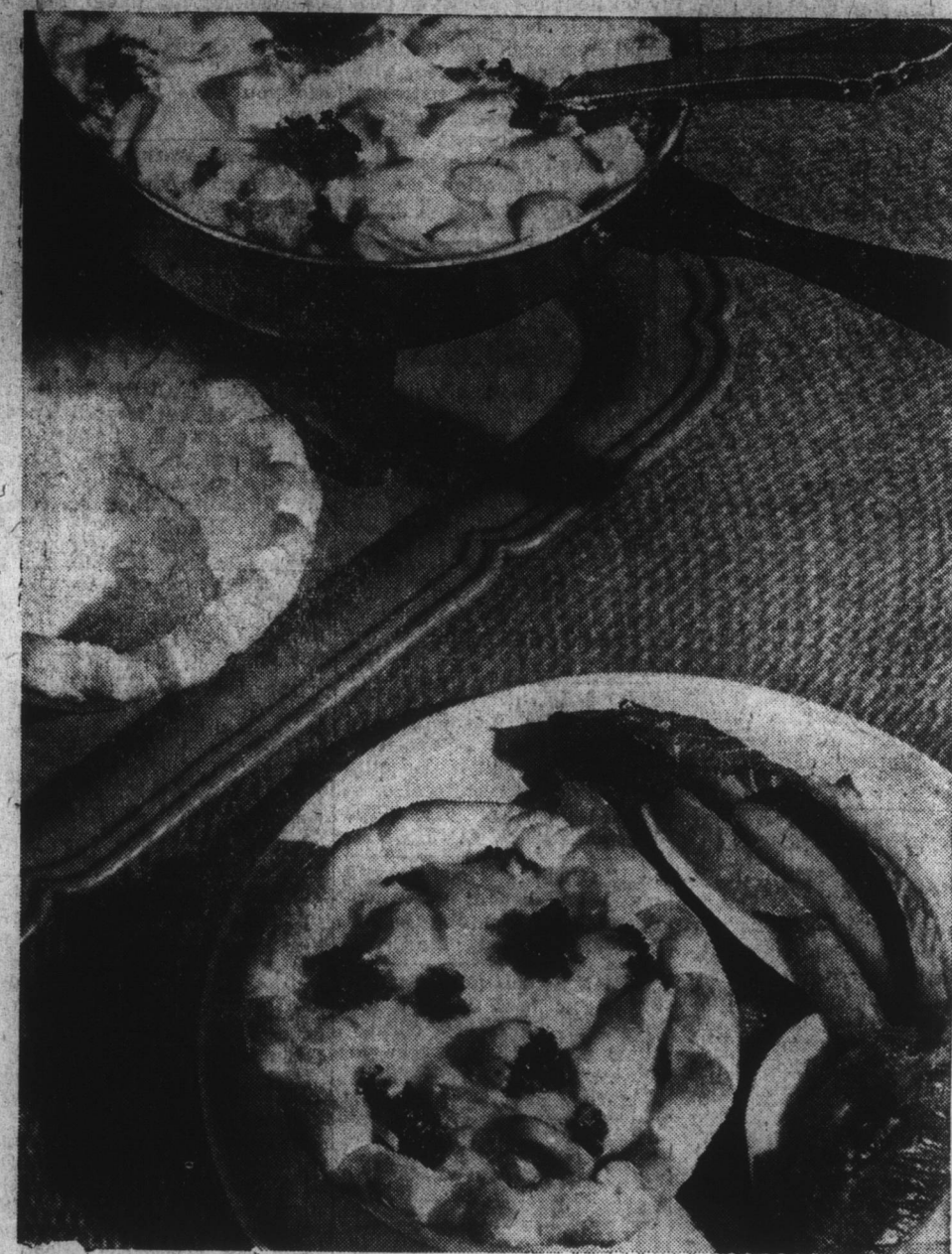

Here's a pudding quickie which comes to us from the Family Circle Magazine. Melt one package (6 ounces) semi-sweet-chocolate pieces, stir in one jar (8 ounces) junior prunes, then fold in one cup cream, whipped. Divide among six dessert dishes and chill until serving time.

For a busy-day frosting, just sprinkle lots of confectioners' sugar over cake

batter in pan, then bake. Top comes out with a sparkly crystal layer that stays on best if cake is cut right in the pan.

The next time you serve a ham steak, spread the top generously with bottled pineapple-sundae sauce and bake it in a slow oven (325 degrees) about an hour. The sauce seasons the meat all the way through, glazes it sparkly-rich and saves the fuss of stirring up a homemade topper.

Serving your next luncheon buffet style?

Buffet chicken, served from a chafing dish bespeaks elegance. Four pre-prepared foods—canned chicken, cheese soup and mushrooms, and frozen broccoli—are easy to combine, heat, and ladle into tender, curry-flavored biscuit shells. Prepare the filling in an electric or top-of-the-stove saucepan then transfer the bubbling-hot mixture into your very prettiest chafing dish. The biscuit shells are make-aheads. Make them this way.

Curry Biscuit Shells

2 cups sifted self-rising flour
1/4 teaspoon curry powder
1/3 cup shortening
1/2 cup milk

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Into mixing bowl sift together flour and curry powder. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Blend in enough milk to make a soft dough. Onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth turn out dough and knead gently 30 seconds. Divide in six equal portions; roll each one-eighth inch thick. Fit into tart or muffin tins. Trim dough and flute edge. Prick bottom and sides with a fork. Bake 15 to 20 minutes, or until lightly browned. Remove shells from pans and cool on wire rack.

Broccoli Chicken Filling
3 cups chopped cooked chicken
1 can (10 oz.) condensed Cheddar cheese soup
1 jar (2 1/2 oz.) sliced mushrooms
1/2 cup milk
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen chopped broccoli, thawed

In saucepan combine chicken, soup, mushrooms, milk and lemon juice. Cover and simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in broccoli and simmer 10 minutes longer, or until broccoli is tender. Spoon into curry biscuit shells.

Secret Of Jam Given By Agent

What's in a name? It may be a blue ribbon at the fair if the produce is a jam and the label calls it a preserve.

Now, whether it's a jam or a preserve may not have much to do with how well it pleases our family. But, after assisting with the judging at our Chowan County Fair and at the 5-County Fair in Elizabeth City, I can report that what may be the best jam in the fair will not even be considered when it is entered as a preserve and vice versa.

Won't you check yourself to see if you have been calling your jam a preserve. Preserves should be made of small whole fruits or of uniform pieces of large whole fruits. They should be cooked in syrup until plump and tender, yet firm. They should not be overcooked that is cooked until the pieces fall apart.

Jams on the other hand should be cooked until the fruit forms a thick, smooth mass or paste of jelly-like consistency.

Speaking of preserving, if you have gathered a quantity of green tomatoes ahead of the frost, don't refrigerate—the temperature in your refrigerator is too low to allow proper ripening. Wrap in newspaper, two or three layers deep, and store in a cool place in the house, basement, or garage. Move to a warmer place, about 70 degrees F. for 3-4 days as you desire them for eating.

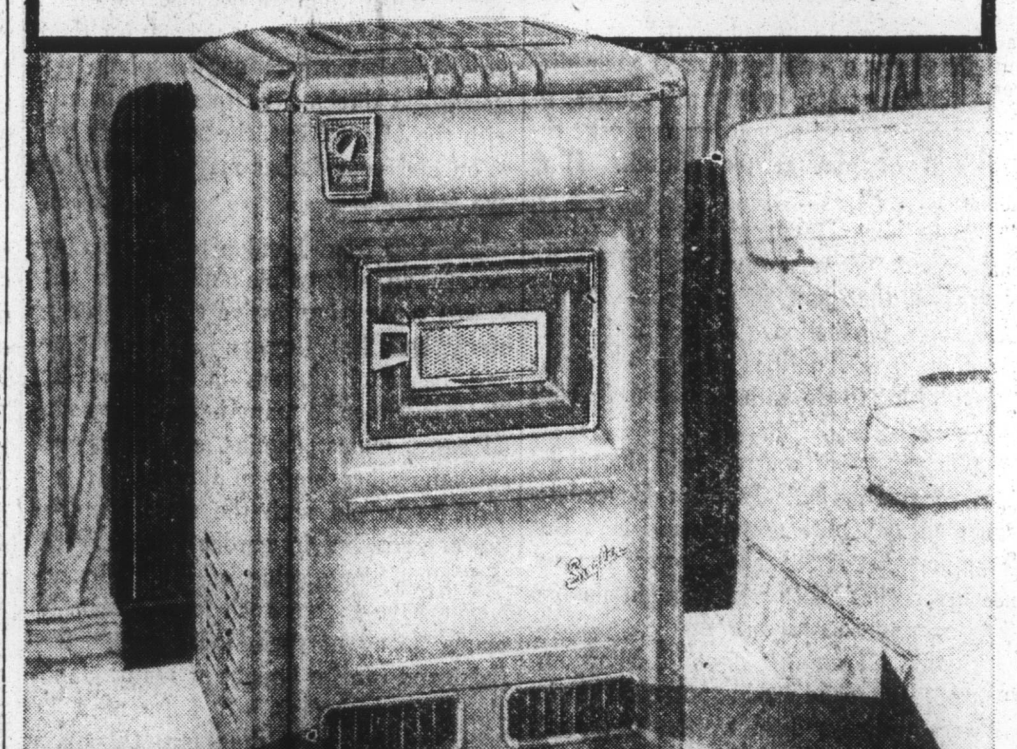
