Parrish, Griffin Attend Institute

WILSON—Police Chief J. D. Parrish and Sgt. Melvin W. Griffin of the Edenton Police Department recently enrolled in a 30-hour Police Chief's Administration course sponsored by the Wilson County Technical Institute in cooperation with the Coastal Plain Law Enforcement Association.

While attending they received instruction in such subjects as: Police and Human Relations, Personnel Evaluation, Personnel and Training Problems, Recruitment and Selection of Personnel, and Police and Control. Inmates for the course were furnished by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Eighteen law enforcement officers, most of whom were chiefs, attended this course which is offered as a part of Wilson County Technical Institute's program to continually offer training to law enforcement personnel.

The next course available at the institute will be Supervision for Police, October 14-November 8.

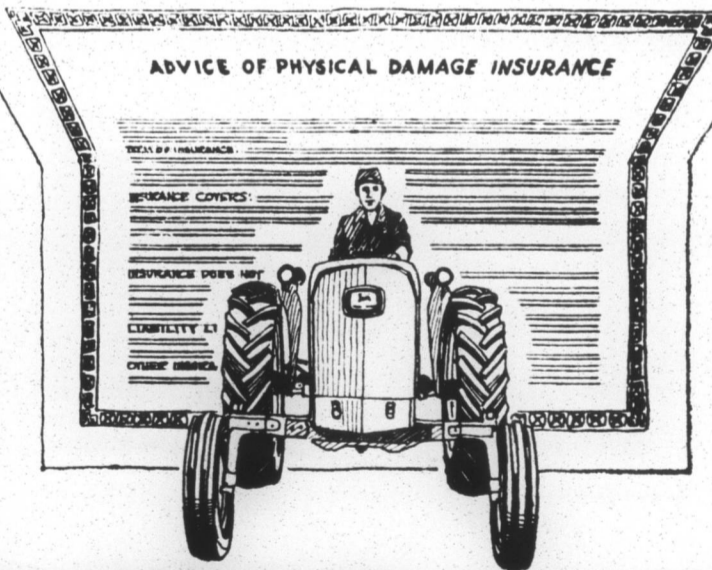
It's time to be thinking about cake baking, especially applesauce cake, which is delicious made by the following recipe, given to me by Buff's niece who is visiting us:

2 cups flour, sifted together with 1 tsp. soda,
1 tsp. cloves,
1 tsp. cinnamon,
1/8 tsp. salt,
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar,
1/2 cup shortening,
2 cups applesauce,
2 eggs,
2 cups raisins (cooked and drained).
Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs (well beaten), and applesauce, then dry ingredients mixed with raisins. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

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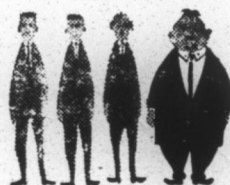
