Owners Register Firearms By Law

During the firearms registration amnesty period of November 2 through December 1, alcohol and tobacco tax offices throughout North Carolina received 3,037 inquiries about registration of certain firearms and destructive devices.

A total of 1,591 weapons in this category were registered and 35 weapons were abandoned by the owners to the department. The amnesty period is now over and individuals who possess firearms or destructive devices and did not register them are cautioned that they are subject to a fine of up to \$10,000 and/or imprisonment of up to 10 years.
