Brabble Attends Farming Course

Bankers of North Carolina are continuing their award-winning service to agriculture through the sponsorship of the annual two-week short course in modern farming at N. C. State University. The 17th annual session is set for January 20-31 in Raleigh. Scholarships for 1,814 young North Carolinians involved in agriculture have been provided by the hometown banks since the short course began in 1953. This week the County Key Banker for Chowan County, George Lewis, announced that banks in this area will send one young farmer to Raleigh for the short course. All expenses will be paid by the banks. Attending the short course from this county will be Tommy Brabble. Peoples Bank & Trust Company and First National Bank of Eastern

North Carolina are sponsoring Brabble. The short course began Monday morning and ends on Friday, January 31. A total enrollment of more than 100 is expected. While in Raleigh these young farmers from all sections of North Carolina will learn to recognize and evaluate modern technology in a changing agribusiness environment. The program covers broad areas of interest to agricultural leaders and specific commodity information. The short course is one of the numerous agricultural projects sponsored by the NCBA. For 23 consecutive years the association has won a national award for its outstanding farm programs.

We learned that vocational rehabilitation services are for those persons with unseen handicaps as well as those who have handicaps that show. Handicaps may be caused by accidents, disease or may be a result of birth defect. It was interesting to note that the rehabilitation program was organized in 1921 and that there are approximately 200,000 handicaps in our state. Many of these handicaps are being trained for a job that is right for them. It is possible for students who have a handicap that might limit his

future employment opportunities to obtain a scholarship to a four-year college or industrial school.

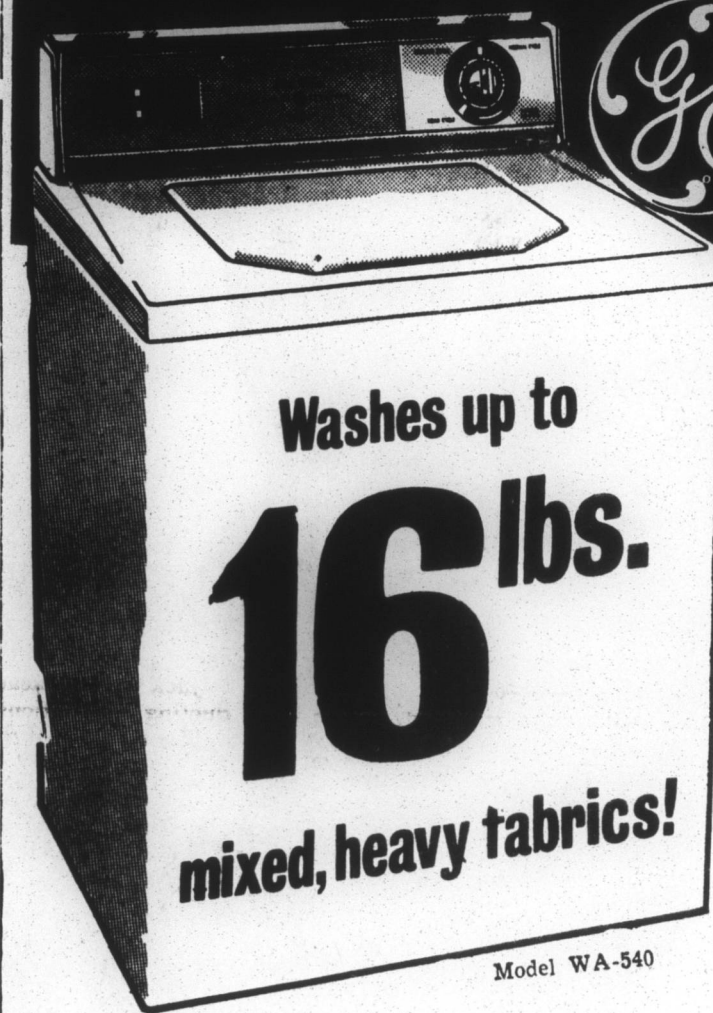
Dr. Pope spoke twice during the conference, first on the challenges cattlemen face in the future and later on stretching profits from the cow herd.

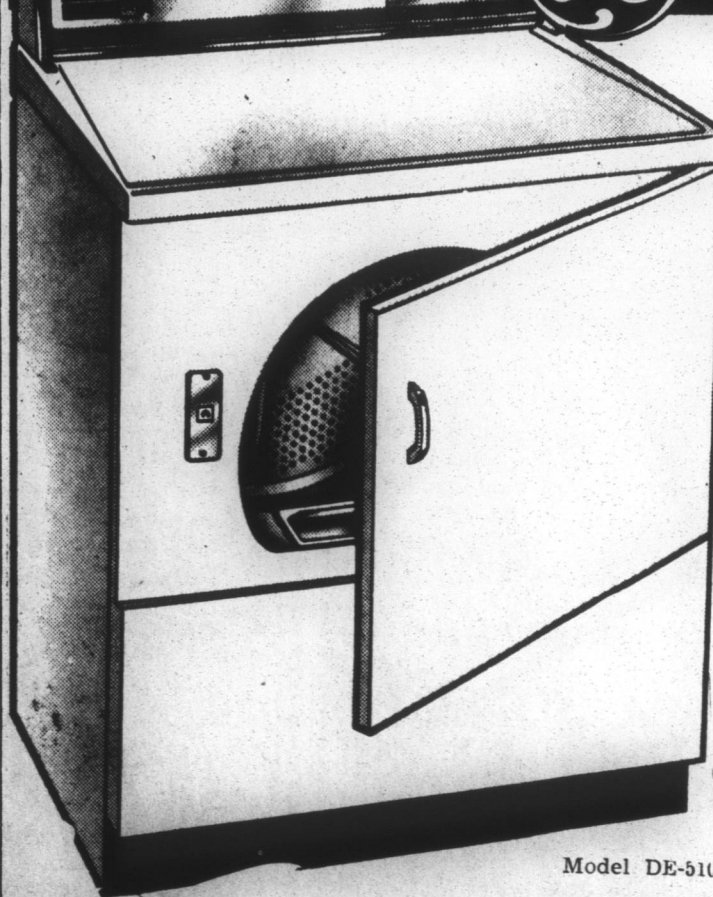
