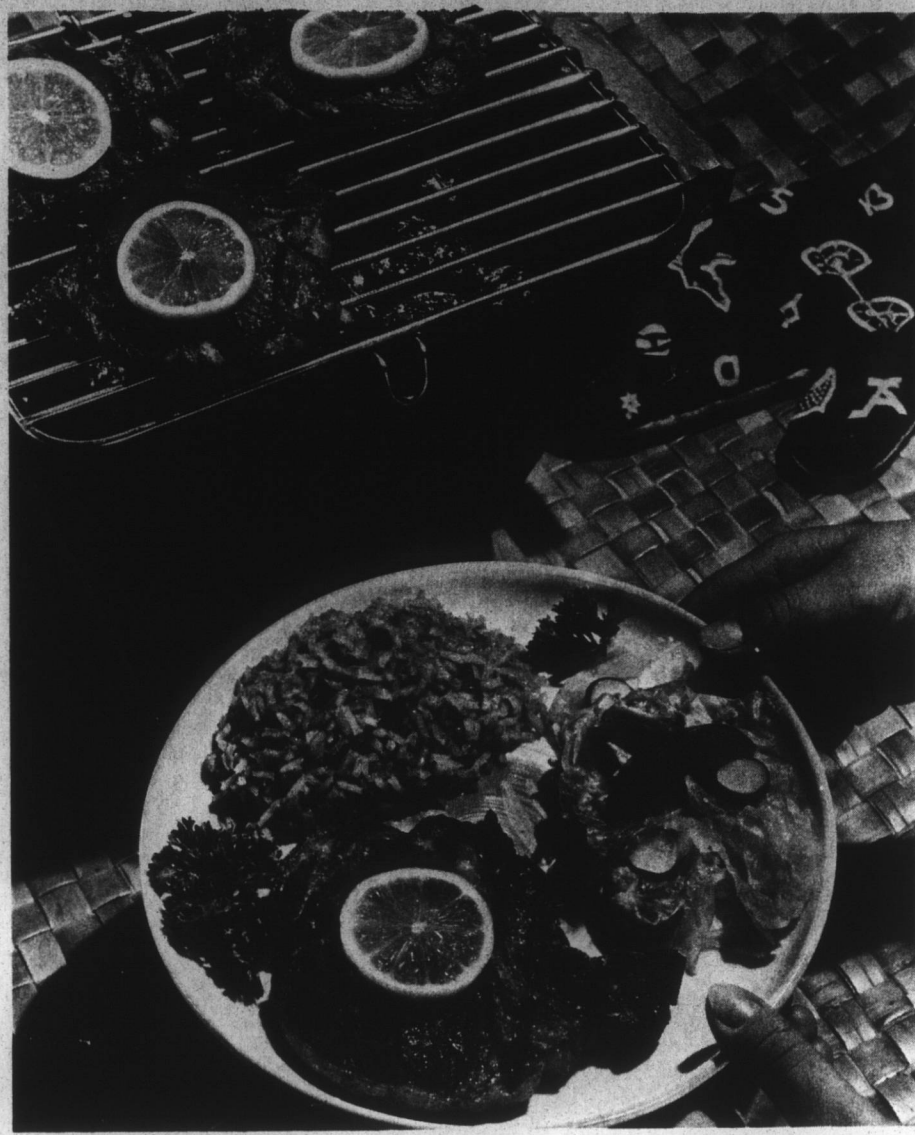

GRILLED CHOPS — Sauce up the lamb chops with a tangy lemon mint barbecue sauce and vary the menu for eating out of doors. Add a fluffy rice side dish, tall glasses of iced tea and your favorite dessert. Invite the neighbors over for the backyard supper or serve it up to the family.

Since everyone in the family, even Mom, likes to eat out of doors during the summer months, try to vary the menu.

Even if it's hamburger or franks, they are better if they are cooked over charcoal and served up in the fading day light.

Lamb chops are not very good for the budget but they are delicious. Since they cost about the same as steak, try them some twilight over the coals basted with Lemon Mint Sauce.

Of course, lemon and mint goes with lamb just like some of those other American go-togethers such as apple pie and cheese—

ham and eggs, etc. We'd suggest a side dish of fluffy rice, a tossed or fresh fruit salad, cold iced tea spiked with plenty of fresh lemon juice and maybe a yummy slice of cake.

Lemon Mint Barbecue Sauce

1/3 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice.
1/2 cup mint jelly.
2 tablespoons soy sauce.
1/4 cup brown sugar.
1 tablespoon butter.
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder.
Dash of hot sauce, if desired.

Combine all ingredients in saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring until jelly is melted. Remove from heat. Use as a marinade for lamb chops or chicken;

Rice Exotica

1 cup raw converted rice.
1 onion, chopped.
3 tablespoons olive oil or butter.
2 chicken bouillon cubes.
3/4 cup boiling water.
1 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon freshly grated lemon peel.
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 cup water.
1 1/2 teaspoons dill.

Saute rice and onion in hot oil until slightly golden, but not brown. Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling water; combine

with remaining ingredients, except dill. Add liquid to rice; add dill and stir to blend. Cover and simmer for 20 to 25 minutes until tender. When ready to serve, stir with a fork to fluff. Serves four.

We had a wonderful combination of fresh fruit for a salad recently. Make up your own to suit your fancy. We combined watermelon balls, fresh pineapple spikes, cantaloupe and honeydew chunks and plump, juicy fresh strawberries. Tucked in was a sprig of fresh mint for flavor and for nibbling.

Here is a good salad dressing for a fresh fruit combination:

Honey Lime Dressing
2 eggs.
1/2 cup honey.
Juice of one lime.
1/2 pint (1 cup) heavy cream, whipped.

Beat eggs in top of double boiler until light and fluffy; stir in honey and juice. Cook over hot, not boiling, water until thick. Pour into a bowl
