30 YEARS AGO
 In a term of Chowan Superior Court a grand jury for the first time publicly disapproved the action of a petit jury in Chowan County. The criticism grew out of a verdict of not guilty in favor of C. A. Cooke, Woodville prison camp guard, who was charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill.
 Mrs. B. W. Evans was

injured in an automobile wreck at Fayetteville while accompanying Mr. and Mrs. Ted Ford to Atlanta, Ga.
 Edenton High School Band presented a concert in front of the Court House at Hertford.
 At a meeting of the executive committee of the Ocean Highway Association it was unanimously advocated that U. S. 17 highway continue to pass through Edenton instead, as had been intimated, to cross the Albemarle Sound bridge and into Plymouth.
 That the WPA bookmobile was proving very popular was reflected in the fact that about 1,000 books were circulated throughout the county.
 Alford L. Layton, 43, was found dead along the Roanoke River near Weldon. The body was found by three Negro women returning from a fishing trip, when it was seen buried to the knees in a muddy ravine.
 The Red Men defeated the Masons-Rotarians to win the city softball championship in a five-game series.
 Edenton High School's football team, under Coach David Holton, defeated Columbia High School in the first football game played on the new athletic field.
 Mrs. W. D. Holmes, Sr., entertained at a tea in honor of Mrs. William D. Holmes, Jr., a recent bride.
 The marriage of Miss

Mary Elizabeth Upchurch to Elliott Belch was solemnized in the Presbyterian Church at Mount Gilead.
 J. G. Perry, Chowan County game warden, received 30 wild turkeys for distribution in Chowan County.
 County representatives met at the office of Farm Agent J. B. Small to formulate plans for the second annual Negro fair in Chowan County.
 At a special meeting of Town Council plans and specifications for the new Norfolk Southern Bus Corporation's bus station between the Mills and Nejam buildings were approved.
 Representative Lindsay Warren notified Postmaster C. E. Kramer that there would be no rural route consolidation out of Edenton, an announcement of which was opposed by practically every rural mail patron.
 Postmaster C. E. Kramer was notified that provision had been made in the next itinerary schedule for a philatelic truck to visit Edenton for the benefit of local stamp collectors.
 Dr. W. I. Hart, treasurer of the Edenton-Chowan County Chamber of Commerce, reported that a membership campaign had netted 61 member and \$545 collected.
 Mrs. William C. Waff, 71, died at her home on Court Street after being in bad health for several years.

 Fire Chief R. K. Hall was ill at his home when bronchial pneumonia developed.
 Radio station WCNC went on the air in Elizabeth City as the first radio station in the Albemarle area.
 Plans were made to publish "The Spotlight" at Edenton High School semi-weekly instead of once a month.
