

A program for the purchase of sweet potatoes for distribution to the School Lunch Program and other eligible outlets was annunced today by H. O. Carter, executive director for the North Carolina State ASCS office. Sweet potatoes must be of the "Porto Rican" type or varieties of similar varietal characteristics. They shall be washed and meet the requirements of U.S. No. 1 grade, or better, as defined in "United States Standards for Grades, of Sweet Potatoes," effective July 1, 1963, except that the tolerance allowed for sweet potatoes affected by soft rot or wet breakdown shall not exceed 1 per cent and further, that no package shall exceed 2 per cent soft rot or wet breakdown or 10 per cent total defects, except that at least one defective and one offsize specimen may be permitted in any package. The sweet potatoes shall be treated at time of packing with a fungicidal dip or spray suitable for the product in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations, and must be inspected by the Federal-State Inspection Service. The price will be \$2.75 per bushel, loaded on trucks at the option of USDA at the point of purchase, for sweet potatoes purchased and accepted under the program. Pur-chases will be limited to growers, cooperative asso-ciations of growers, or growers' authorized agents. Further details of the program may be obtained
