## Rep. Jones Cited Senator B. Everett Jordan Reports

### For His Record

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Rep. Walter B. Jones of the First District of North Carolina, was honored on Monday in the nation's capital. Rep. Jones was presented the Distinguished Service Award by the board of trustees of the non-partisan Americans for Constitutional Action.  
ACA's Distinguished Service Award is bestowed every two years upon those legislators whose voting records in the Congress of the United States support legislation which serve to strengthen and defend the spirit and principles of the Constitution of the United States.

In presenting the award to Rep. Jones, Adm. Ben Morell, chairman of the board of trustees, stated: "On behalf of our trustees I have the pleasure of congratulating you and thanking you for your outstanding record in the Congress and devotion to those fundamental principles of good government which serve to promote individual rights and responsibilities; a sound dollar; a growing economy, and a desire for victory over communist aggression."

"The acceptance of this award does not imply that you are in complete agreement with all of the principles espoused by ACA nor does it imply any commitment for you to support them in the future," emphasized Adm. Morell. "Our purpose is solely to honor you for your dedication to the Constitution of the United States."  
Rep. Jones is now serving his third term as a member of the United States Congress.

WASHINGTON — North Carolina will get about \$9.5 million for public works projects, including \$500,000 for a start on the Falls of the Neuse dam, if the House accepts figures approved by the Senate for this fiscal year.

The total in the Senate-passed public works bill is about \$1.9 billion above that allowed by the House and includes amounts not otherwise provided for seven projects in the state for which, with support of

Senator Sam Ervin, I had asked the Senate Appropriations Public Works Subcommittee earlier this year to allot money.  
Funds for the Neuse project are earmarked for land acquisition and engineering and design to set the stage for future construction of this greatly-needed development.

The Senate bill also allows \$300,000 more than the House had provided for continuing construction of the New Hope dam—bringing the year's total up to \$5 million for that project—and includes \$100,000 for a planning start on the Randleman dam as the second stage in development of the Cape Fear River Basin. The House bill allows nothing for that.

Other major additions in the Senate bill include: A \$1 million allotment for engineering and design of the Mills River dam and reservoir as part of the TVA development in the Upper French Broad Basin near Asheville, for which the House allowed only \$100,000 in planning funds.

\$150,000 to initiate planning of the Reddies River

dam and reservoir near the Yadkin River Junction in Wilkes County.  
\$200,000 for dredging a 32-foot channel between Castle Street and Hilton Bridge in the Wilmington Harbor area.  
\$200,000 to complete construction on the Wrightsville Beach hurricane protection and beach erosion project, and \$70,000 to start planning of a similar project for the Cape Lookout area.

Other projects funded under both the Senate and House versions include: Deepening the Wilmington Harbor, \$1.7 million; navigation improvements, Cape Fear River above Wilmington \$357,000; Buckhorn Dam in Wilson County (flood control planning) \$45,000; Northeast Cape Fear River (navigation planning) \$32,000; Upper Cape Fear Basin (flood control planning) \$70,000, and Northeast North Carolina area (flood control planning) \$60,000.

I am extremely pleased with the Senate action and will do all I can to see that these provisions are retained so that work can proceed on these necessary projects.

Nash, "Breast Cancer"; Mrs. Inez Martinez, "Nursing Care of the Patient With Breast Cancer"; Dr. Bryan C. West, Jr., "Uterine Cancer and Treatment"; and Dr. Samuel G. Jenkins, Jr., "Lung Cancer."

All registered nurses (employed or inactive), student nurses, licensed practical nurses, industrial nurses in the service or service hospitals and office and clinical nurses are cordially invited to attend this program.

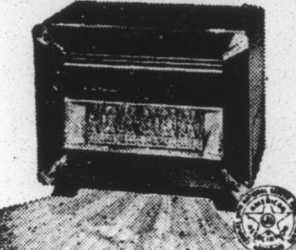
