Resolved that the Board of Commissioners upon being informed of the death of our Chairman, Honorable William E. Bond, on Friday, March 20, 1970, do express our deep distress and sorrow upon his passing after valiantly trying to overcome a long and critical illness. We wish to record sincerest regret and sympathy on the occasion of his death after so many years of service, both as a member of the Board of Commissioners and as Chairman. William E. Bond was first appointed to the Board on April 7, 1952 and served as a member until August, 1958, when he became Chairman of the Board and continued to serve as Chairman from that date until the time of his death. During his term as Chairman he also acted as Chief Administrator of Chowan County and actively worked each day for many hours to advance the affairs and business of Chowan County. He kept up an active interest and correspondence with all State Agencies which had any part in administering the affairs of the County. His administration of Chairman was marked by many forward looking improvements within Chowan County including the building of John A. Holmes High School, the construction of the new Chowan Hospital, the obtaining of several new industries within the County and the

general improvement of business within the community.

We do hereby record the fact that William E. Bond was a conscientious Administrator who did many things to improve the affairs of

Chowan County and who knew the business of the County better than anyone else in the community.
