It happens. World-record fish are caught by people who have never before held a fishing rod in their hands. How? Trolling. Anybody can do it. All it takes is 90 per cent luck and 10 per cent good fortune. How do you do it? You charter a boat and sit in a chair and wait until the mate tells you to pick up the rod and start reeling in. If your arm and back are in good shape, you've got a fish. It happens all the time. Because of the above, the sport of trolling has earned itself a bad reputation. Non-fishing types off on a vacation to Ocean City or Aca-pulco want to try it out because it is something new and different, like miniature golf and enchiladas. And to behold Gertrude or Herman, fat and 50, catches a big fish. Nothing to it. The truth is that in such cases the angler has little to do with the fact that a fish has been caught. All hats must be doffed to the know-how and forbearance of the crew. For trolling is a difficult, exacting and demanding sport. Without a computer one cannot say just how many combinations or variable factors there are in big-boat trolling. To come up with the correct answers you need to experiment from experience. This calls for a hard-fishing, hard-thinking angler, one familiar with the grounds to be fished and the habits of the target fish—either a professional fishing captain or an avid amateur who prefers fishing to his job, wife and lawn.

The professional troller has at least one big advantage over the amateur—he fishes every day. Most fish caught trolling are migratory species and it takes day-to-day observation and surveillance to be able to accurately predict their movements. If you can't find the fish, all the professional technique in the world isn't going to catch you one. Also, the charter skipper will know what the fish are feeding on and what baits they are hitting. And he will have had the time to experiment with boat speeds, and how far back to drop the baits. In short, he will know at the beginning of the fishing day what it will take even the experienced amateur precious time to find out.

## Sewage Disposal System Is Must

Public health laws of North Carolina require that any person owning or controlling any residence, place of business or place of public assembly shall provide a sanitary system of sewage disposal, consisting of an approved privy, approved septic tank or a connection to a sewer system.

Some persons are inclined to believe mobile homes are not included or can share toilet facilities with nearby homes or trailers. Each mobile home is considered a residence and such facility must be provided for each unit.

In case of a septic tank system, a permit must be secured from the local Health Department before work is started on such installation. This permit is issued to the person or persons making the installation.

There are several owners of residences who appear to neglect warnings from the Health Department in providing such facilities. If this neglect continues, this will give cause for the Health Department to take legal action. The cooperation of persons concerned is asked in order to avoid any unpleasant action.

## Badges For Enumerators

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 census of population and housing. District Manager Jerry Scott pointed out today. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women) started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks. Each census taker will wear a red, white and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide. Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office, which is located in the old Post Office Building, corner of Third and Evans Streets, Greenville, N. C. 27834. Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils and other tools necessary for her work.

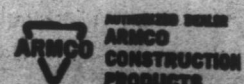
She is a member of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church and was active in St. Martha's Guild for 11 years in Goldsboro.
