



Report From Washington By Rep. Walter B. Jones

The Senate last week approved the District of Columbia Anti-Crime Bill, which had passed the House several weeks ago. Although this applies only to the District of Columbia, it is hoped that it will serve as a model for the states in the event that the results show a decrease in the crime rate. Recent figures show that for the last 10 years, crime has increased 211 per cent, while in Washington, D. C., it has gone up 431 per cent. The bill as ap-

proved by the Senate contains some controversial sections which brought about some opposition. One provision provides for pre-trial detention—up to 90 days—of criminal defendants whom a court finds likely to commit further crimes if they were released on bail pending trial. And opposition also to a provision authorizing police to enter without warning if announcing their presence might endanger them, lead to destruction of evidence, or result in a suspect's escape—this was known as the "no knock" provision. Also, it increases the length of sentences for habitual, professional criminals.

During the week the House approved the HEW-Labor Appropriation Bill providing for \$18.8 billion. The bill as approved contains appropriations for the Labor Department as well as other related agencies. The total figure is \$93 million more than the administration had requested. All North Carolina members voted favorably on final passage.

By a vote of 388 to 3, the House agreed to a conference report to extend the federal-state unemployment compensation program. Under existing federal law, unemployment tax applies to employers who employ four or more individuals for a certain period of time. It further extends the coverage to certain public employees, such as institutions of higher education in an instructional, research or principal administrative capacity. An amendment was offered to extend unemployment compensation to agricultural laborers. This was defeated by a vote of 219 to 170. On this motion, again all members of the North Carolina delegation voted no.

The House Committee on Agriculture after several months consideration, reported out a farm bill. Basically, it is the one presented by the administration and contains little of the language provided in the coalition bill which

I co-sponsored many months ago. An impasse had developed within the committee, and it appeared that at one time there would be no farm legislation in this Congress. Recalling the disastrous effects to the farmers of this nation during the period when there were no price supports or controls, I came to the conclusion that even though the farm bill as approved is not one with which I agree completely, it is better than no farm bill at all.

Funds Sought To Aid Victims

WASHINGTON—The American Chamber of Commerce of Peru has announced a \$1 million fund drive to aid victims of the May 30 Peruvian earthquake, largest single disaster in the recorded history of the western world.

The announcement was made through the offices of the Association of American Chambers of Commerce in Latin America, in cooperation with the Andean Foundation, a non-profit organization concerned with Latin American development which works with the American Chamber in Peru on social action projects.

Robert C. Helander, president of the American Chamber of Commerce of Peru, who is also vice president of International Basic Economy Corporation, Lima, said the Peru Chamber has already applied its entire social action budget to aid victims of the disaster and is now soliciting additional funds on a worldwide basis.

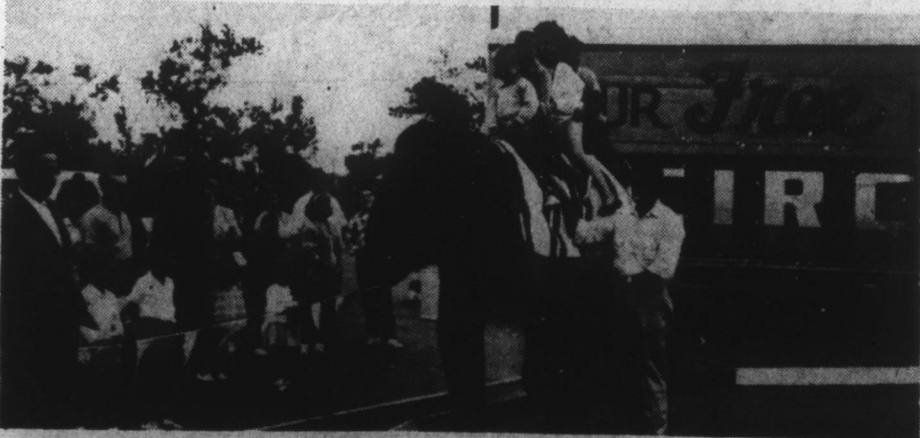
