



Report From Washington By Rep. Walter B. Jones

The House reconvened when and where delivered. Wednesday, September 9, following a three-week summer recess. The remainder of the week saw the House approving several bills of major importance, including a Rate Pay System for 850,000 government employees. The provisions of this bill are as follows:

1. Establishes a Federal Prevailing Wage Advisory Committee.
2. Provides for a five step wage schedule instead of the present three steps.
3. Provides for a 7 1/2 per cent pay differential, nationwide for scheduled non-summer work during the second shift and 10 per cent for the third shift.
4. Provides "saved pay" for two years for prevailing rate employees who are reduced in grade.
5. Brings the employees of nonappropriated fund activities of the armed forces and employees of the Veterans' Canteen Service, within the several states, under the provisions of the prevailing pay rate system.
6. Provides a 25 per cent pay differential for Sunday work and double pay for holiday work for nonappropriated fund employees.

Many of you are aware of the increased use of credit cards and some of the financial dangers which it entails. As a result, the House passed legislation to regulate the mailing of unsolicited credit cards. The basic provisions are as follows: A credit card of any kind is nonmailable unless such card is solicited by the addressee; or is a replacement of one previously issued to the addressee; or in the case of a lost, mislaid, or stolen credit card previously issued, is being returned to the addressee by mail, with delivery restricted to addressee and return receipt requested showing to whom,

Another bill of interest to all citizens passed by the House was an authorization to provide for grants for communicable disease control. Communicable diseases are listed as tuberculosis, venereal disease, rubella, measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and Rh disease. The authorization provides for \$20 million for fiscal year 1970; \$75 million for fiscal year 1971, and \$90 million for fiscal year 1972.

The House also approved legislation to provide for a one-year extension of financing for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, in the amount of an outright appropriation of up to \$30 million for CPB for fiscal 1971, and an additional amount not exceeding \$5 million could be appropriated to it to match gifts, grants and other contributions received by the corporation. The Corporation for Public Broadcasting is a part of the National Educational Television and various other worthwhile projects for national television.

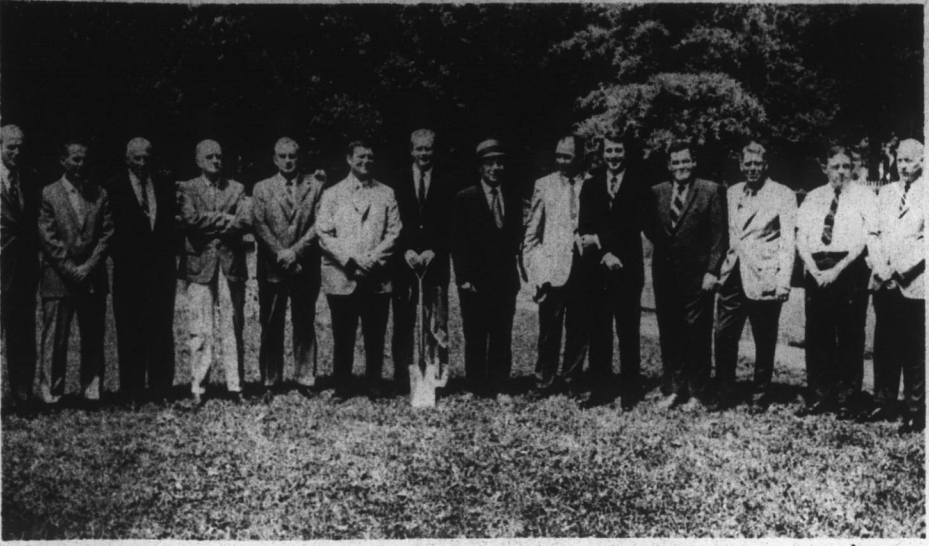
Battleship Still Popular

WILMINGTON—An attendance increase of more than 25 per cent was registered during the 1970 season for the outdoor drama "The Immortal Showboat" at the USS North Carolina Battleship Memorial here.

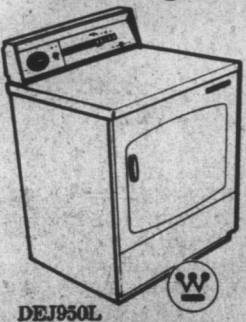

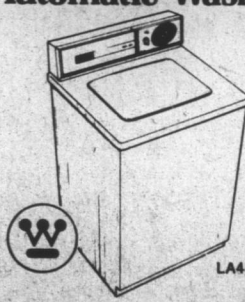
