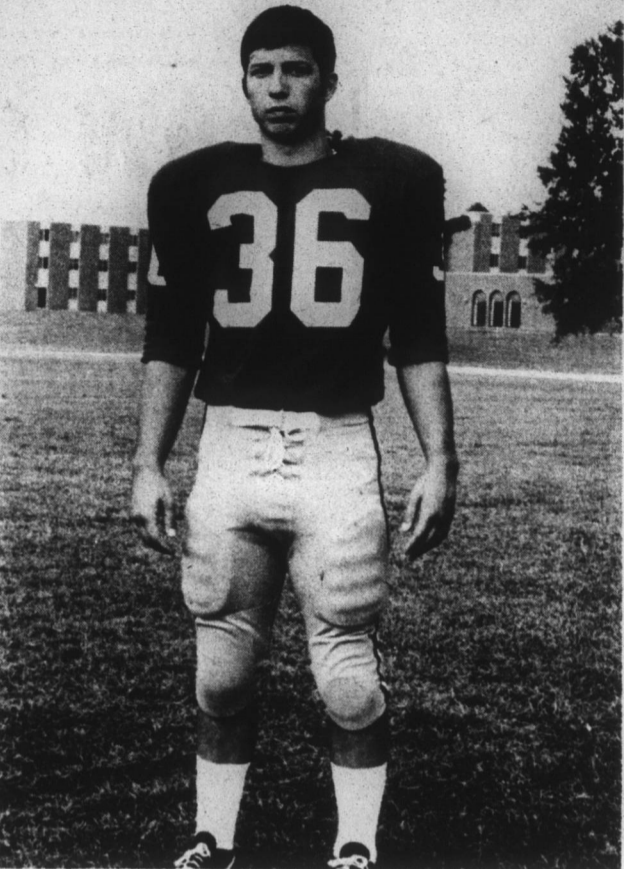

Q. What is the time limit for filing Part B Medicare claims?

A. Claims may be filed for expenses in the current year, the past year and October, November and December of the year before that. For example, during 1970, claims may be filed for expenses in 1970, expenses in 1969 and expenses in October, November and December, 1968.

Leary Impressive In Elon's Victory

Leary opened his college football career with a smash, scoring three touchdowns as the Elon freshman team stomped Hargrave Military Academy 47-0 September 18. Leary, an Edenton native who joins defensive backfield

coach Jerry Tolley and freshman coach Mike Overton, both of the same hometown and high school (John A. Holmes) at Elon, latched onto scoring serials of 27 and 55 yards from Elon fresh quarterback Alan Parham in the

game and also ran two yards for another score on the flanker sweep. Leary, considered by most other college coaches as being too small at 5 ft. 8 in., 165 pounds, to play college ball, made believers out of many with his showing. And Coaches Tolley and Overton, who talked until their tongues were sore to get the speedster, couldn't have been more pleased.

"I knew when I came to Elon that I would have to prove myself as a football player," Leary said. "Elon is a fine school and it has a fantastic football program. I only hope I can put out enough to do a good job. I feel proud to be a member of the Elon team."

The flanker, who runs the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat, and who set an Albe-Marle Conference record of 22.1 seconds in the 220, has always been a winner throughout high school, and he doesn't want to stop now. At John A. Holmes, Leary earned 11 letters in high school athletics. He was honorable mention All-Conference and honorable mention All-East as a junior in football and came back to make both squads as a senior. In his senior campaign on the gridiron, Leary was captain of the Edenton club which won the Eastern State 2-A football championship. He was also the Most Valuable Player on the team and the squad's Best Offensive Player.

An all-around athlete, Leary won All-Conference and All-East honors in his junior year on the baseball field. And, as far as honors go, he excelled most in track where he was All-Conference and All-State in both his junior and senior years.

"He's a great athlete," Elon Head Coach Red Wilson says of Leary.

Fresh Coach Mike Overton went a little further and said, "He just continues to be as good a player in college as he was in high school. In his debut as a college football player, he scored three touchdowns and led all scorers. He should have a great future at Elon at the flanker position, where he can use his great speed to pay off."

Parham to Leary could be a combination that'll be heard of quite frequently in the next four years at Elon, home of the Fighting Christians.

Unusual 'Line' Aid To Women

"Why is Rubella important; does Rubella have a pattern; who should receive the new vaccine?"

"These are but a few of the many questions which can be answered by calling the March of Dimes Stork Line," stated William Z. Wood, 1971 North Carolina State March of Dimes chairman.

To better serve the needs of North Carolina, the Stork Line has turned its attention to the topic of Rubella. "At the present time, plans are being made to vaccinate approximately 175,000 children, ages 1 through 12, between now and November 1," Mr. Wood reported.

"But for these campaigns to be a complete success the public must be made aware of the facts, and this will be the job of the Stork Line."

When a caller dials 800-432-6546 (toll free), he hears a recorded message from Dr. Blair Bryan of the Mecklenburg County Medical Society. Then the caller has the opportunity to ask questions about his local campaign or the new Rubella vaccine itself.

Since beginning operation July 1, the March of Dimes Stork Line has received over 1,700 telephone calls.

TODAY'S FARMER EFFICIENT TOILER, BIG CUSTOMER

Today's farmer is a mighty efficient man. His productivity has been climbing more than five per cent per year, "roughly twice the rate for industry," as Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has pointed out. In 1969, U. S. farmers produced over 20 per cent more products on six per cent fewer acres than in 1957-59.

In terms of persons supplied by one farm worker, the man who produced enough for himself and six others at the turn of the century was producing enough for himself and 42 others by 1968—with the aid of supply and marketing industries.

Marketing farm food and fiber alone provides about five million non-farm jobs for which payroll and fringe benefits are \$25 billion. Thirty per cent of jobs in private employment are agriculture-related.

Besides being a major supplier to the U. S. economy, agriculture is a \$50 billion customer. Among the purchases: 6.5 million tons of steel in the form of tractors, other motor vehicles, machinery and equipment; more petroleum than any other single industry—and more electricity than Chicago, Detroit, Boston, Baltimore and Washington, D. C.
