

Area Mental Health Center Functions

Charles R. Franklin, Jr., director, Albemarle Mental Health Center, reported November 2 to Chowan commissioners on progress being made at the center. He said the budget is now \$87,040 with funds coming from six counties in the area.

Chowan budgeted \$3,000 but he said the directors hope this can be increased by \$1,000 during the year.

Franklin said in fiscal 1971-72 the participation would be on 50 cents per capita with counties which do not come up to this amount getting limited services.

He explained that the state matches local funds on a two for one basis.

Commissioners passed a resolution in support of the Coastal Freeway.

Mrs. Elizabeth Goodwin, tax collector, said collections the first month since the notices were mailed are about

on par with last year. Prepayments were much less this year, she reported.

Mrs. Pansy Elliott, county accountant, reported the assessed valuation as being \$38,269,171, which will bring in \$58,422 over what was budgeted. She said the budget was "running close."

George asked the accountant if she had figured in \$14,500 in delinquent collections. She replied that this had been budgeted only by the schools.

Mrs. Lena M. Leary, clerk of court, reported the state had authorized a part-time employee for her office and she would need some additional equipment. She made a specific request for a desk.

Commissioners Bateman and Phillips were to work on this problem.

Pete Thompson, county extension chairman, reminded commissioners of the AADA

annual meeting here December 4 at National Guard Armory with Gov. Bob Scott as the keynote speaker.

He said a 15-county swine meeting will be held at the fairgrounds on November 10.

The rescue squad reported 35 calls, traveling 1,807 miles at an expense of \$405.81. Ashley said \$86 was received in contributions for calls.

Tax Supervisor Sherlon Layton presented several notices of relief from taxes on property purchased in recent months by Edenton Housing Authority. They were approved.

Commissioners, upon request of Sheriff Troy Toppin, approved action to request the 1971 General Assembly to pass a local bill allowing a deputy sheriff to also serve as ABC officer.

George Lewis, chairman of the Chowan County Planning Board, appeared and asked for a \$300 budget. This was approved. The board meets the fourth Tuesday in each month in the extension office conference room in the county office building.

He said a special meeting will be held at 8 P. M., Monday to receive the sub-division regulations from the county planner.

Mize, all of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Delores Stewart of Indianapolis, Ind.; two brothers, Charles and Benjamin, both of Decatur, Ill.; five sisters: Mrs. Esta Sorrel of Shelbyville, Ill.; Mrs. Thelma Badman of Stonington, Ill.; Mrs. Grace Stanberry of Pana, Ill.; Mrs. May Wirey of Stonington, Ill.; and Mrs. Rosella Leigh of Decatur, Ill., and four grandchildren.

He was a veterans of World War II.

Funeral services were held at 3 P. M. Tuesday in Williford Memorial Chapel with Rev. Russell Rice in charge. Burial was in Beaver Hill Cemetery. Williford Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

Culture Week In Greensboro

RALEIGH — North Carolina's 13 cultural and historical organizations are now making last-minute plans for their annual week-long gathering scheduled for December 1-5 in Greensboro. "Culture Week," traditionally held in Raleigh, takes place in Greensboro this year in conjunction with the beginning of the Guilford County Bicentennial observance.

Many of the participating organizations have grown up around the N. C. Literary and Historical Association which was founded in 1900 "to organize the literary talent of the state" and to coordinate the activities of regional cultural organizations. Notable among its many accomplishments was its sponsorship in 1903 of legislation establishing the N. C. Historical Commission, now the State Department of Archives and History.

The name "Culture Week," first applied in a spoofing editorial reference, was liked and informally adopted by the late Dr. Christopher Crittenden, then director of the State Department of Archives and History.

This year's gathering of the 13 independent organizations will feature several speakers of national prominence and the annual presentation of awards to outstanding North Carolinians for literary, artistic, historical and musical excellence.

Wes Chesson, Leo Hart Smashing Duke Records

DURHAM — As they approach the last two games of their college careers, Duke's great passing combo of Leo Hart and Wes Chesson have few team and conference records left to conquer.

Hart, the 6-3, 195-pound quarterback from Kinston, will end his career among the top five passers in NCAA history.

Hart has completed 452 passes in 802 attempts, an excellent 56.3 per cent, for over three miles in yardage—5,554 yards. All of these figures are Duke and ACC records.

Hart has suffered only 29 interceptions in three years, an average of only one in each 27 pass attempts.

Hart has added 173 yards rushing for 5,727 yards total offense on 1,061 offensive plays, both records. That's an average of 5.4 yards per play.

Hart has thrown 19 TD passes and has scored 13 himself. His 32 touchdown responsibility figure is tops at Duke and trails Virginia's Bob Davis by seven for the ACC record.

Chesson, the 6-2, 190-pound wide receiver from Edenton, has caught 149 passes for 2,060 career yards, Duke and ACC records.

Adding 418 yards rushing, Chesson's total yardage of 2,497 ranks him fifth on Duke's career list, trailing Hart, Billy Cox (3,761), Scotty Glacken (3,300) and Tom Davis (2,640).

A number of Duke season records are in jeopardy now, thanks to seniors Hart and Chesson and sophomore running sensation Steve Jones.

Hart and Chesson also have a chance to set season marks as well as their numerous career records. Hart holds the team season completion record with 162 in 1968; he now has 145.

Chesson has 59 season catches for 741 yards, both short, but within reach of the records held by Henley Carter of 65 catches for 892 yards in 1968.

Most important for Duke fans, the Blue Devils have a chance, by winning their final two road contests with South Carolina and North Carolina, to win seven games for the first time since 1962, also the last time they won an ACC title outright, another reward waiting for two season-ending wins.

Vets Corner

(Editor's Note: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on the veterans' benefits may be obtained at any VA office).

Q. Is there a final date for conversion of a National Service Life Insurance policy?

A. It can usually be converted at any time the policy is current. However, there are some policies prefixed by "W" that cannot be converted if the renewal date comes after the insured's 50th birthday. In this case, the conversion right must be exercised before the term runs out.
