### \$1.5 Million Is **Spent Daily to Fight Pollution**

The president of the American Petroleum Institute has announced that the oil industry's yearly domestic antipollution expenditures have more than doubled in the past five years.

Frank N. Ikard disclosed that a new API survey of oil companies showed that annual spending increased from about \$270 million in 1966 to \$559 million in 1970—a rate of \$11/2 million a day-on pollution-control equipment and environmental research. Over the five-year period, the industry has spent more than \$2 billion in the conservation field, the survey showed.

"These sharply increased conservation expenditures come at the very time that business profits generally have declined," Mr. Ikard pointed out. "But oil companies have wisely decided to accept the reduced profits that result from anti-pollution expenditures. They view this as a sound, long-range investment in both the public and corporate interest."

Heavy investments made in the Caribbean and elsewhere to provide low-sulfur fuel oils required to meet new air pollution regulations in the U.S. were not included in the survey findings.
