



### Meeting Individual Needs Is Challenge In Guidance

From the guidance point of view, when school enrollment increases, individual needs are more difficult to meet; however, with a voluntary team interest of everyone concerned some changes can be made without having to request HEW grants, consultants, coordinators and other special titles.

One of the major functions of guidance services is the informational and activities service providing whatever information, educational, occupational, personal, social that would benefit the student. Students at John A. Holmes High School now have five ways to obtain informational services: The guidance department, the study hall guidance library and resource center, the regular school library, the Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library and the homeroom teacher.

The newest feature added is the study hall guidance library and resource center. Approximately 400 students, who spend part of their time in study period each day, can now browse through occupational, educational, personal, social and community resource information including all College of the Albemarle student and adult programs and activities and Elizabeth City State University student programs.

A guidance bulletin board carries all pertinent guidance information such as scholarships, jobs, college information, testing and speaking.

Request forms and a note file are located in the guidance library and resource center for students to make written requests for additional information. Each day the file is turned into the guidance office. A written reply or a scheduled conference is set up for the student.

A "Weekly Newspaper In the Rough" from the guidance office is available for each homeroom so that all students will have an opportunity to know the activities scheduled in the guidance library and resource center plus other pertinent guidance information.

A voluntary guidance committee of students has been selected in each study period for future improvement of the program.

As a resource center, students were given a voluntary interest and activities survey form. The survey included hobbies and career representatives. Student responses were numerous. Scheduled programs on an individual or small group basis thus far have been the Project COA, Armed Forces Aptitude Test, director of a practical nursing program, a textile representative and a vocational rehabilitation counselor. Many programs are scheduled throughout the school term.

Many voluntary interests are about to develop into an industry. With the aid of an old, borrowed sewing machine, materialistic results are quite evident. Three hundred stuffed animal pillows, coat hangers, dresses and skirts have been made by both girls and boys. Varied voluntary interest will be scheduled throughout the year.

The slogan for the guidance library and resource center is: "Study First; Voluntary Interest Next."

Many people, including community resources, have joined in an individual or team effort in carrying through the informational service and voluntary activities for all students. As principal, Cecil Fry made the proposal a working model by enthusiastically approving the



idea. Homeroom teachers' contribution in homeroom guidance has been an asset in every aspect. A person who has assisted in many aspects of the program and without her many voluntary interests such as pillow making would not have evolved, is Mrs. Roy Harrell, study hall teacher-aid.

Mrs. Harrell, who has previously worked with Girl Scouts and church youth groups, has tremendous ability in the crafts area. The school is very fortunate to have Mrs. Harrell, who has voluntarily assumed this interest in student hobbies.

Mrs. Rudolph Dale, teacher aide, is also giving much of her free time in teaching students various crafts. Mrs.

Thelma Hare, a school secretary, Linwood Lewis and Eugene Rascoe, vocational teachers, have also contributed tremendously in carrying through projects and voluntary interests.

Many students have accepted responsibility in assisting in providing more voluntary services for students.

Seeing a need to provide available guidance services for not only students after school hours and weekends but also for adults and younger children, provisions have been made with Mrs. Sandra Phillips, director of the Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library, to set a special section in the public library for guidance information.

Cooperative efforts are being made to establish a comprehensive guidance library in the future that will provide guidance information for students from kindergarten to adulthood.

Post graduate and adult interest and desire for further educational, vocational, leisure-type interests and hobbies have increased to the extent that it is necessary to provide a center for more available information.

Many positive comments have been made by the students, members of the faculty and other adults in regard to the program thus far. Attitudes of many students have improved. Students work together more

#### Resolution Concerning Modified Full-Time Registration

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By the Chowan County Board of Elections:

Section 1. That the Chowan County Board of Elections hereby adopts the Modified Full-time Voter Registration as adopted by the State Board of Elections for Counties with under 6,500 registered voters, to become effective and to be implemented in Chowan County as of January, 1971.

Section 2. That after January 1, 1971, the registration books will be open for registration of voter in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State of North Carolina at the office of the Chowan County Board of Elections in the County Office Building on East King Street between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and 1:00 P. M. three days each week, Monday,

Wednesday, Friday, unless the office be closed under the authority of the Chowan County Board of Commissioners.

Section 3. That registrars are authorized to register voters in their precinct only during the usual registration period and they shall not attend the polls for registration except upon special instructions by the County Board of Elections.

Section 4. That notice of this action shall be given to the State Board of Elections, the Chairman of each political party in the County and by publications made by advertisement in a newspaper having general circulation in the County.

Section 5. That the telephone installed in the office of the Chowan County Board of Elections with the number 482-4988, which is designated the official telephone number of the Board and such number shall be transmitted to the State Board of Elections.
