HOOTS

READY TO READ—In a recent issue of the National PTA Bulletin there was a checklist for parents to use in determining how well they are preparing their children to learn to read. The first few questions were especially dear to my heart because I am a firm believer in the usefulness of these habits. How many parents of preschool children can answer "Yes" to these questions:

—I sing and recite nursery songs and rhymes to my child and have done so since he was an infant.

—I read something (newspaper, magazine, book) every day. Every day my child sees me getting pleasure and information from reading.

—I have a library card, the best of all credit cards.

—I take my child to the

library frequently.

—Together we look at children's books and select some to borrow for reading aloud at home.

—I read aloud to my child at least 15 minutes every day.

—I often ask my child to tell me a story or to describe something he has seen or done.

—I am on the lookout for story-telling and read-aloud hours at the public library, a church, or elsewhere, and I arrange to take my child or have him taken to them.

The Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library is here to serve all the members of this county—those who already read and those who don't or can't. Let us help you make your child ready to read.

SCREECHES

COMPLEX OPERATION—How would you like to cope with buying books for 77 library systems from jobbers who have to deal with several hundred publishers? Ordering the books is just the first step. Then comes classifying them (deciding on the number which goes on the spine and determines the book's location on the shelf) cataloging them (making the cards that go in the card catalog drawers) and processing them (marking the numbers, inserting the circulation pocket and covering the jacket with plastic). Then comes the sorting process to make sure each library gets the books they ordered.

Last Wednesday, I spent the day in Raleigh at the North Carolina State Library attending the Advisory Committee meeting for the Processing Center which handles the procedures I have described above. Since I am new to the committee, I was given a tour by my classmate from UNC, Judith Sutton, who is now on the staff of the Processing Center. It is an amazing operation. They handle approximately 150,000 books a year and very few of them stay on the shelves in the center more than a week or two. The Advisory Committee includes librarians from systems of all sizes—from the Children's Coordinator in Charlotte-Mecklenburg County where there are 15 branch libraries, a book budget of almost \$200,000 and an annual circulation of 1 1/3 million books to the head of a county library with one building, less than \$3,000 to spend on books and an annual circulation of 35,000 books. Thus the problems of big, little and in-between libraries were voiced.
