Some of us who like coffee just plain like the flavor. So, there is more to do with that flavor than pour it out of the pot or spoon it out of a jar.

When it comes time for those relaxing moments after an exquisite meal, finish it off with a flair by serving luscious coffee desserts along with a cup of coffee, of course.

Most of us fail to realize how much fun recipes can be made with this age-old brew. It is and can be an exciting ingredient in cookery.

Java Pumpkin Pie really perks up the after-dinner atmosphere, highlighted by the ingredient of richly brewed coffee, and topped with whipped cream and chopped walnuts—a no-bake goodie. For the sweet tooth, whip up a Coffee Angel Tort, prepared with one cup strong hot coffee and garnished with chocolate shavings.

Something new in coffee-maker, incidentally, is this handsome pot by Oster. It is made of transparent polysulphone, won't crack or leak and eliminates metallic taste.

It resists coffee staining and is easy to clean, they say.

Java Pumpkin Pie
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin

1/2 cup coffee, heating to boiling.
1/2 cup cold milk.
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar.

2 cups canned pumpkin.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg.
1/4 teaspoon ginger.
1/2 cup heavy cream.
1 cup ice cubes or crushed ice.

1 graham cracker crust or pastry shell.

Put cold milk and gelatin into blender container, add hot coffee; cover and process at "stir" until gelatin is dissolved. Add brown sugar, pumpkin, salt, spices and cream; cover and process at "blend" until smooth. Push "frappe" button; add ice cubes one at a time and process until ice is liquefied. Let stand about five minutes, then pour into prepared crust. Chill until firm.

Coffee Angel Tort
1 pkg. angel food cake mix.

48 regular sized marshmallows.

1 cup strong, hot coffee.
1 cup heavy cream.

Prepare cake mix as directed. When thoroughly cool, remove from pan and cut crosswise into three layers. Meanwhile melt marshmallows in coffee over medium heat, stirring often. Chill until partially set. Whip cream and fold into gelatin mixture. Spread between cake layers. Frost top and sides with Chocolate Whipped Cream. To make combine one-half cup sugar, one-third cup cocoa, one-fourth teaspoon salt, two teaspoons vanilla and one and one-half cups heavy cream in small mixing bowl and beat with a rotary beater until thickened. Even in this age of informality, there occasionally comes times when nothing but more formal entertaining will do. Receptions or teas to mark anniversaries, to welcome new teachers or neighbors, or to honor favorite sons and distinguished daughters are all occasions to polish the silver and bring out the punch bowl. 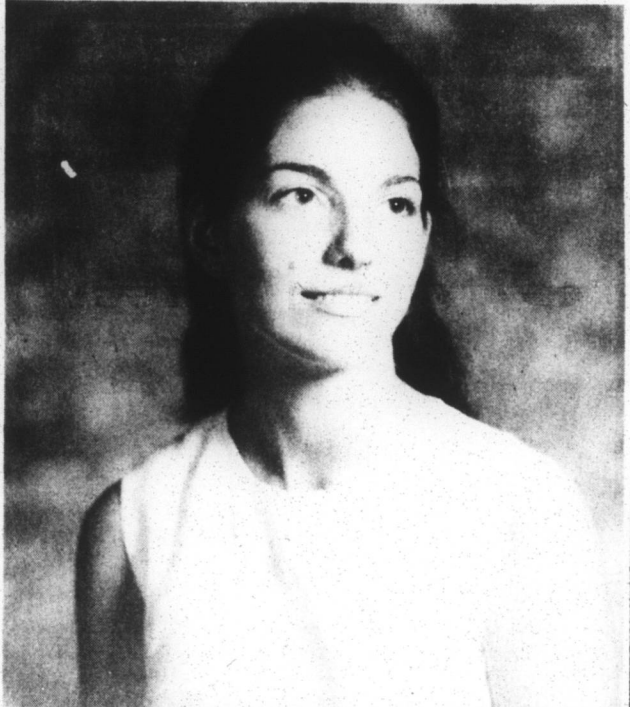
Miss Furgieue Plans To Marry
