

Downtown Parking Space Assigned Police Cruiser

Chief J. D. Parrish of the Edenton Police Department made a request on Tuesday of last week at the Edenton Town Council meeting that a parking space be designated for police and emergency vehicle use only in the uptown area.

For many years the police vehicles have parked in a fire hydrant zone in front of the Betty Shoppe and Chief Parrish stated the department has been receiving criticism for doing so.

The council agreed to let the parking space beside the fire hydrant be used for police and emergency vehicles only. It will be marked as such in the immediate future.

Also on the council agenda was the discussion of a dog ordinance. Council members stated they feel there is a need for a dog ordinance and that it should be enforced.

Chief Parrish stated that since he has been the chief of police this is one of the main sources of complaints from residents.

He remarked that at least 15 complaints are logged each month and this does not include the complaints that policemen on patrol receive.

The fact that the county has started a dog program was also mentioned.

The council agreed that different ordinances should be looked into and that a public hearing should be held on the situation.

Mrs. Novella Wilson came before the council members with a complaint about an "unsightly, unclean and unhealthy" ditch in front of her house. The ditch is situated on the corner of Freemason and Oakum Streets.

A public hearing was held on the Granville Street petition and after no objections the council approved a sidewalk to be constructed on Granville Street.

A public hearing was also held on the passing of a subdivision ordinance.

D. F. Walker and Shelton Moore stated opposing views to the ordinance.

The ordinance was approved by the council members.

BP Oil Company was awarded the contract for gas and oil for the coming year. Also bidding were J. H. Conger & Son and Leary Oil Company.

Council members are to consider an ordinance to require an attendant at automatic coin operated gas pumps and bring it for discussion at the next meeting.

C. A. Phillips, chairman of the Chowan County commissioners, came before the council and requested that they consider the joint use of the town's property, formerly owned by Union Camp, if the new courthouse site is to be on the Waff and Woolard property behind the Municipal Building.

Mayor George Akma Byrum stated that the Camp property was the only way the town could expand their building in the future but they would consider Phillips' request.

The council agreed to maintain and pay the electric bill for the Edenton tennis courts after the Edenton Rotary Club donated \$1,000 toward the purchase of lights for the court.

The surfacing and resurfacing of streets is to be scheduled as soon as weather enables the town to work on them.

A request came from the AADA for financial support and it will be considered.
