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Birthday Parade Set Today

The "Two-Five-O" Anniversary Parade will be held at 11 A. M., today (Thursday) with 48 units scheduled to pass in review down Broad Street.

This will be another highlight of the eight-day celebration which began last Sunday and ends with another Edenton Tea Party on Sunday afternoon.

Ray Midgett, parade chairman, said the lead band will be the "Patriots Drum and Bugle Corps" of Wilson. This is a 75-member band dressed in colorful red and white Colonial costumes.

As a special salute to the Town of Edenton, The Patriots will play a salute in front of the reviewing stand, which is to be located in front of Bank of North Carolina. The salute will be in the form of a selection of southern

On the reviewing stand will be Mayor George Alma Byrum and members of the Town Council along with former mayors and other guests. Pat Flanagan will be the announcer.

The parade will form at Hicks Field and march down Broad Street, turn east onto Water Street and march back to Hicks Field via Oakum Street.

Unique Look at Family Planning

Family planning is becoming of age. On all levels of government and in many segments of society, increased interest is being placed on this health and economic problem.

Interest in and emphasis on family planning has grown so fast many agencies designated to deliver the services have been going around in circles. Therefore, there exists many duplication of service. By the same token, in some areas no services exist. Period!

It was for this reason that the Comprehensive Health Council in the 10 counties which make up Region "R," appointed a Family Planning Task Force to develop a comprehensive plan which would consolidate the services being offered by existing agencies and expand the services to make them available to the entire population, not just the poor.

This is what the Task Force has done. After five months of plowing through data, the 15-member study group discovered more than half of the 14,117 women in the region in need of family planning services were not being reached. Why? They were in the income group of \$3,000 or over.

Therefore, the plan devised is designed to reach more people with more services, in a better manner and at little more

ATLANTA, Ga. - Southeastern hogs bucked the national trend of lower prices to sell steady to 50 cents higher during the week ended June 9, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Prices for large and medium size eggs trended upward. Green beans, cabbage and bell peppers brought higher prices.

Feeder steers trended steady to 50 cents higher, but feeder calves and slaughter calves and cows continued the downward trend begun the previous

Cotton prices turned downward. The watermelon market steadied after trending downward most of the week. Peach

prices also weakened. Both heavy and light hens brought

Task Force Adopts Ambitious Family Planning Proposal

A proposal to develop an inter-ageninter-disciplinary comprehensive family planning program for the 10 Albemarle Area counties has been approved by the Region "R" Comprehensive Health Council,

The proposal, developed over the past five months by a 15-member Family Planning Task Force, is believed to be the most comprehensive multi-county plan ever put together in the South-

The plan calls for the formation of a non-profit corporation to administer a program which ties together Economic Improvement Council, Inc., health departments and Departments of Social Service in the region. The estimated cost of \$255,050 would not require local funding.
