



Connecticut is planning a statewide system for disposing of garbage, trash, and other solid wastes with maximum recovery of material and energy.

It is quite analogous in many ways to the challenge we faced and helped solve in the 1960's when NASA asked GE to work with them in initially defining the approach to getting men to the moon," he said.

Fifteen regional planning agencies and 169 Connecticut cities and towns are expected to play active roles in the planning and implementation process.
