Hunt To Visit Lower Albemarle

Jim Hunt, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, will visit the Albemarle Area Saturday. Hunt, who has been carrying on a vigorous, person-to-person campaign across the state, has three stops scheduled in the area before he heads for a church retreat on Bogue Sound. His first stop is at noon in Plymouth, where he will hold a press conference and meet with key campaign people in Washington County. He will be accompanied by his county chairman, Andrew Romanet of Plymouth. Hunt will be in Columbia at 2 P. M. to attend the Albemarle Area firemen's parade, an annual event in the 10-county region. He will be

met there by Rhett White and Jake Walker. Both men are from Columbia and are among Hunt's key supporters in the area. At 4:45 P. M. Hunt will be at Mattamuskeet School to attend the annual Jaycees' Farm Day, the biggest event in Hyde County each year. Several thousand people are expected to attend. Jaycee Roger Spencer of Swan Quarter, Hunt's Hyde County campaign chairman, will accompany the candidate. Hunt has been in the Albemarle Area many times during the course of his campaign for the office of lieutenant governor. He has had high praise for the Albemarle Area Development Association and, in

speeches in other areas of the state, has cited the association as a good example of what counties can accomplish when they band together to solve their own problems. Hunt will end his visit to the area Saturday night and head for the Presbyterian Camp on Bogue Sound between Morehead City and Newport, where his church, the First Presbyterian Church of Wilson, is holding a weekend retreat. An active churchman, Hunt was recently elected an elder in his church and will take office on January 1, 1973. The retreat is for all former, present and future elders. The retreat ends at noon on Sunday.

Pesticides Must Now Be Registered

The North Carolina Pesticide Law of 1971 requires all restricted-use pesticide dealers, commercial ground applicators and pest control consultants to obtain a provisional or interim license by January 1, 1973. Aerial applicators had to obtain a provisional license by July 1, 1972. Applications for a 1973 provisional or interim license will be mailed by November 1, 1972, by the N. C. Department of Agriculture to all restricted-use pesticide dealers, commercial ground applicators and pest control consultants who are on the mailing list of the Department of Agriculture. If you do not receive an application by November 1, 1972, but will need a license, please write to: Mr. William B. Buffalo, Administrator, Pesticide Branch, N. C. Department of Agriculture, Raleigh, N. C. 27611. All provisional or interim (temporary) licenses will expire on December 31, 1973. Before any restricted-use pesticide dealer, aerial or ground applicator or pest control consultant obtains a license for 1974, he will be required to

pass a qualifying examination demonstrating his knowledge of pesticide (laws, regulations, usefulness and hazards) and his competence as a pesticide dealer, applicator or consultant. Pesticide dealers, applicators and consultants should contact their local county agricultural extension office if they have questions concerning the legal definitions of a restricted-use pesticide, a restricted-use pesticide dealer, a pesticide applicator or a pest control consultant. 'Gig' Leary Is Star For Elon College Team

ELON COLLEGE—Plunker Curtis (Gig) Leary and defensive back Brent Sexton have been chosen by the Elon Fighting Christian coaching staff as "Christian Fighters of the Week" for their performances in Saturday's 21-0 victory over Shepherd College. Leary, a junior from Edenton, was selected as the offensive player of the week while Sexton, a Fayetteville sophomore, received a similar honor on defense. Leary, who has been a starter for the Fighting Christians since the third game of his freshman year, was on the receiving end of eight passes which were good for 82 yards against Shepherd. But more important was the fact that nearly every one of his catches gave the Fighting Christians first downs and added possession time with the ball.

"Every time we threw to him," remarked Coach Ted Wilson, "we got a first down and kept our drives going. He played a crucial role in our winning the game." Coach Wilson went on to add that as a freshman, Leary hitchhiked to Elon's first game of the season, dressed for the second and had fought his way into the starting lineup by the time the third game rolled around. He's been a starter since, leading Elon in pass receptions for last season with 32 receptions for 432 yards and four touchdowns. "He's been one of the most consistent players for the past three years," Coach Wilson added. Elon travels to Clinton, S. C., this week to battle the Blue Hose of Presbyterian College in a very important Carolinas Conference contest.
