Beginning in Northeastern Scotland, she showed slides of wildflowers native to that area such as heathers, foxgloves, bluebells, and pansies. From there to London she saw wildflowers native to Regents Park and St. James Park. An intersting fact, she stated, was that crocus, plentiful in England, bears one of the oldest names in the plant world dating there from the third century B. C.
