Mrs. Chester Stevens and Mrs. L. F. Amburn, Jr., are general chairmen of the function this year.

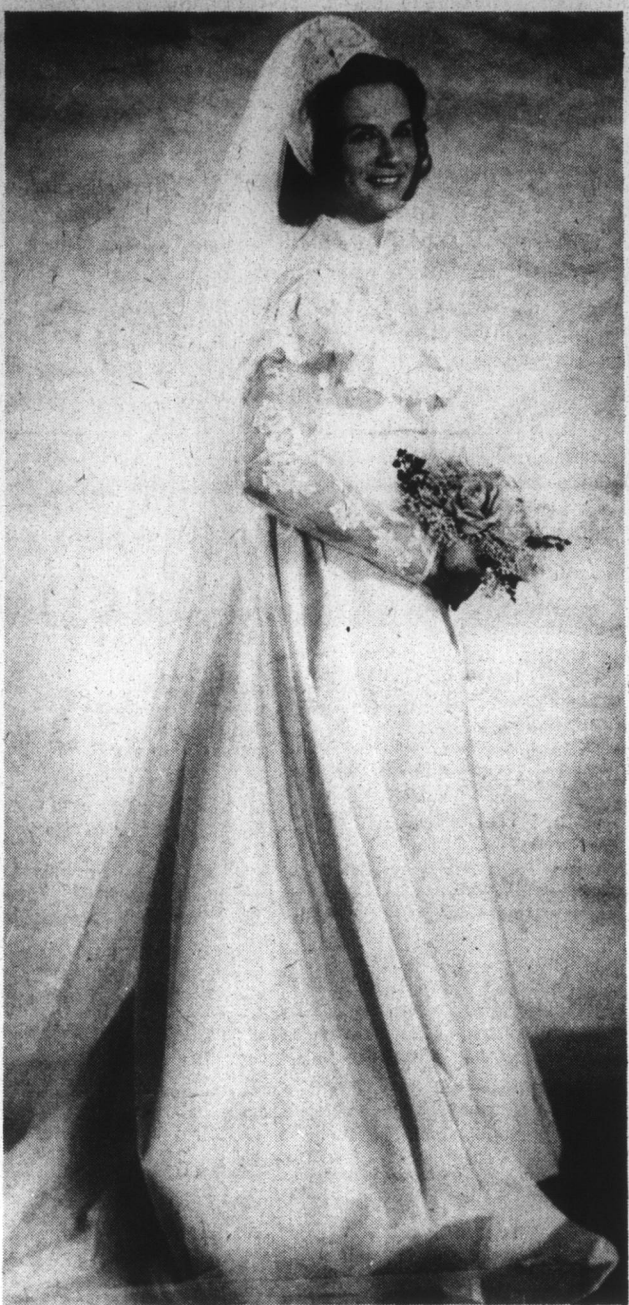

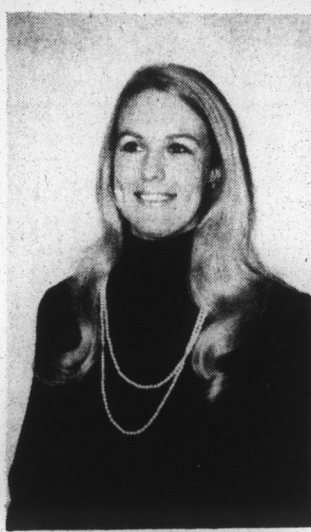

To be eligible a Young Career Woman must be between 21 and 28 years of age and employed in business or the professions with at least one year of full time work experience in her career field. She must be outstanding in scholastic work, community service and church and she must be living, working or attending school in the area of the state federation she represents.

Mrs. Boyce is a 1966 graduate of Chowan High School and attended the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She received her degree from UNC at Chapel Hill and in 1971 was awarded her graduate

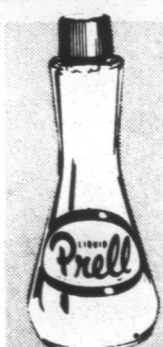
