

Minutes Of Board Of County Commissioners

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, May 7, 1973. Members present: C. A. Phillips, Chairman; C. M. Evans, N. J. George, Alton Elmore, David T. Bateman was absent. The invocation was given by C. M. Evans. Chairman Phillips called the meeting to order. On motion of Commissioner Evans, seconded by Commissioner George and unanimously carried, approving minutes of the previous meetings. On motion of Commissioner Evans, seconded by Commissioner George and unanimously carried, that the payment of bills be approved. **Civil Defense Fund** Blanchard Office Supply, Inc., \$60.41; Murray D. Development Association. Representatives of the Cape Colony Association appeared before the Board stating that the property owners of Cape Colony have a dog ordinance and, if the County Dog Warden can enforce their ordinance. The Board advised by the Commissioners that the property owners' ordinance could not be enforced by the County Animal Control Officer. Due to Federal cut-off funds Earl Jones, Coordinator of E.I.C., appeared before the Board requesting consideration in 1973-74 budget of \$10,700.00, Chowan's prorata share of funds for the continuance of E.I.C. Inc. Program. He was advised that the request will be studied. It was agreed that parking spaces marked for Sheriff's cars in the parking lot be agreeable with the Town. Thomas Cassell, Community Planner, presented a land potential study and sketch development plan for Chowan County for the coming year. The Finance Committee was instructed to work with the Finance Director as to the audit of County records and bring recommendations to the Board. On motion of Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner George and unanimously carried, that Pansy A. Elliott, Finance Officer, be named County Budget Officer. On motion of Commissioner Evans, seconded by Commissioner George, and unanimously carried, that the Tax Collector be relieved of the following taxes: Joe Anna Williams, \$12.01 (1971 taxes); Bessie E. Sessoms Tredwell, 1968 Plymouth double listed, \$3.25 error in posting; Andrew J. Eubanks, \$4.12, error in posting 1970 tax. The Board agreed to make additional payment for services to Allen Appraisal Co. On motion of Commissioner George, seconded by Commissioner Evans and unanimously carried, instructing the Tax Collector to collect back taxes for one year for parcels of land in question. On motion of Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner Evans and unanimously carried, charging pick-up taxes in the amount of \$619.54 to the Tax Collector. On motion of Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner Evans and unanimously carried, authorizing Tax Collector to hold sale for delinquent taxes June 4th, 1973. The Commissioners agreed that the present 50 per cent ratio of appraised valuation by continued. County Coordinator Dallas Jethro, Jr. was authorized to apply for the 21 employees offered by N. C. Manpower Council for summer work, with no cost to the County. Chairman Phillips gave a report on Courthouse Architectural study. On motion of Commissioner George, seconded by Commissioner Evans and unanimously carried, that Everett Fauber, Jr. be retained to conduct preliminary study of proposed Courthouse-Jail Complex. On motion of Commissioner George, seconded by Commissioner Evans and unanimously carried, that J. Clarence Leary, Jr. be

appointed Chowan County Chairman of Bicentennial Committee. On motion of Commissioner George, seconded by Commissioner Elmore and unanimously carried, designating May as Senior Citizens Month. On motion of Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner George and unanimously carried, to pay half of expenses generally agreed upon for Executive Vice-President of Chamber of Commerce, trip to Canada. It was agreed by the Board to levy on \$37,000,000; 1973-74 Budget. The following reports were accepted and ordered filed: Edenton-Chowan Rescue Squad, Inc.; Coroner, Tax Collector, Social Services, Agriculture Ext. Service, Edenton-Chowan Schools, February and March; Veterans Service Officer, Animal Control, Finance Officer. There being no further business the meeting was adjourned. Bertha B. An Ordinance To Protect Flags On Display On and In Front Of The Town Of Edenton Municipal Building

Section 1. DESECRATION OR UNLAWFUL REMOVAL OF FLAGS. It shall be unlawful for any person willfully and knowingly to cast contempt upon any flag placed on display by authority of the Board of Councilmen of the Town of Edenton on the Municipal Building, or immediately in front of said Municipal Building in that area known as the Town Square whereon rests the Memorial Monument by public acts of physical contact including but not limited to mutilation, defiling, defacing, trampling or the unauthorized removal of said flag or flags from the staffs upon which they are displayed. Section 2. PENALTY. The violation of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, punishable upon conviction by a fine not exceeding fifty (\$50.00) Dollars or imprisonment not exceeding Thirty (30) Days, as provided in North Carolina General Statutes 14-4. Section 3. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED. All ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption. Adopted this 29 day of May, 1973.

An Ordinance Regulating Parades, Group Demonstrations in the City of Edenton, North Carolina

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDENTON, NORTH CAROLINA:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this ordinance, the following terms shall have the definitions ascribed:

(a) "block" is that portion of any street lying between its intersections with other streets. (b) "parade" is any assemblage of two or more persons participating in or operating any vehicle in any march, ceremony, show, exhibition or procession of any kind in or upon the public streets, sidewalks, alleys, parks, or other public grounds or places. (c) "person" is any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association, or other organization, whether formal or informal. (d) "group demonstration" is any assembly together or concert or action between or among two or more persons for the purpose of protesting any matter or of making known any position or promotion of any organization or class of persons, or for the purpose of attracting attention to such assembly.

Section 2. PERMIT REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for any person to organize, conduct or participate in any parade, group demonstration in or upon any street, sidewalk, alley, or other public place within the Town of Edenton unless a permit therefor has been issued by the Town of Edenton in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. REQUIREMENTS AND ISSUANCE OF PERMITS. The Chief of Police or his designee shall issue permits as required in the preceding section, and in the issuance thereof he shall:

(a) require a written application for permit to be filled not less than eight (8) hours in advance of such parade or group demonstration with application shall specify the time and place for the commencement of any such activity and the time, place, route, approximate number of participants and duration of any such parade or group demonstration. (b) refuse to issue such permits for parades, or group demonstrations to commence before six o'clock A.M. or terminate after five o'clock P.M. (c) refuse to issue such permits for parades or group demonstrations to be held at the same time and place as those designated in a permit issued pursuant to a written application previously received by the Chief of Police or his designee. (d) require that the application for a permit specify whether or not minors below the age of eighteen (18) years will be permitted to participate. (e) require that the application for a permit shall specify and the permit shall designate the person or persons in charge of the activity. Such person shall be required to accompany the parade or group demonstration, and shall carry such permit with him at that time. Such permit shall not be valid in the possession of any other person.

Section 4. CERTAIN ACTIVITIES PROHIBITED. The following acts undertaken in conjunction with or as a part of, any parade or group demonstration, are hereby prohibited and declared unlawful:

(a) the carrying on or about the person any firearm, or any weapon or article, including but not limited to blackjacks, nightsticks, or whistles, which by their use might constitute a deadly weapon.

(b) the taking or keeping of any dog or other vicious animal, whether leashed or unleashed.

Section 5. REVOCATION OF PERMIT. The Chief of Police shall revoke any permit granted for a parade or group demonstration for any of the following causes:

(a) the violation by any participant of Section 4 of this ordinance;

(b) the failure to comply with the terms and conditions of the permit;

Section 6. INTERFERENCE PROHIBITED. No person shall hamper, obstruct, or interfere with any parade or group demonstration being conducted under authority of a permit duly issued by the Chief of Police.

Section 7. EXCEPTIONS. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to:

(a) funeral processions; (b) any governmental agency acting within the scope of its functions.

Section 8. PENALTY. The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, punishable upon conviction by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) or imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days, as provided in G.S. 14-4. Section 9. All ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption (or other specified time).

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New Financial Aid Program Is Started

"Students who will begin college for the first time this coming September may qualify for a new financial aid program," Gary Parsons, Director of financial Aid at College of The Albemarle said as he started to go over the details in the circular on his desk.
