# Around Farms In Chowan County

Many peanut farmers are asking the question whether they should use Furidan, even though they used Furidan at planting time. The answer to this is, "Yes, you should." Furidan put out at planting time will not control Southern Corn Root Worm that attacks peanuts in August. Our recommendation on Diazone is the same it has been in the past - 14 lbs. of 14G put out in July in a 15 inch band or eight lbs. the first week of August put out in a 15 inch band. If Diazone is broadcast the first week in August, our recommendation is 18 to 20 lbs.

There are also questions on the use of Terraclor for

Southern Stem Rot. As many of you already know, Southern Stem Rot was a problem in 1972 and many peanut farmers are afraid it will become a real problem in Florigiants in 1973. I would follow the label on Terraclor as it comes in different strengths, but we believe that you will be happier with granules that will fall down on to the ground than you will be with liquid terraclor.

Red Spider has been found in some of the peanut patches and this is a hard insect to control. Azadrin has been cleared for red spider will cause a whitening of the leaf. It is usually in spots close to the hedge rows and it will spread throughout the field. Even though they are very hard to control, we certainly suggest that you do all that you can to control this insect.

We are finding many spots with manganese deficiency in the county in soybeans and peanuts. It is not too late to correct this problem and you will find that the returns for

your effort in money will be quite big as compared to the cost. These leaves where manganese deficiency is showing, are yellow with the middle ribs of the leaf dark green. It is very easy to detect and manganese is available at your local dealer.
