"Grease" Engagement Set For Chrysler Hall

Are you a cat or a chick who remembers the Fifties with a glow and a wry question about where have the years gone?

Well, the sock hop lives again in the bubbling musical called "Grease", coming to Chrysler Hall on November 23 and 24 from long runs in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and other big cities. Mail orders are now being received and filled at Norfolk Scope, and the box-office sale began there Monday.

"Grease" has been running on Broadway since early 1972 and it's still continuing there, with no end in sight, bringing back to capacity audiences the era of blue suede shoes, Howdy-Doody, James Dean, pegged pants, Elvis, the Mickey Mouse Club, American Bandstand, hula hops, the Edsel, ducktail haircuts, Alan Freed, Fabian, Chuck Berry — and greasers, so maned for the thick pomades teenagers slicked their hair with. It's in honor of those well-oiled locks that the musical is

called "Grease", for the show is a recap of life in a high school at the peak of the Fifties — 1959.

It has 15 songs, all new in the '70s, that parody the loud, often harsh, simple, strains of rock 'n' roll in its early days. "Several of the tunes" wrote drama critic Dan Sullivan in the Los Angeles Times, "are so good of their kind that they would have been top-toppers if the y'd come out in '59 instead of now. They're instant golden oldies"

The period duplicated in "Grease" was prior to the Rolling Stones and the Beatles, before moonshots and Vietnam, before student dissidents and the campus activists of the mid-

sixties — and that period seems simpler, purer, in retrospect. The mid-60s student activists sneered at students of the Fifties as a "silent generation" but they come alive loud and clear in "Grease", as fizzing as a just-opened Coke.

"These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldiers and the sunshine patriots shrink in this crisis. Shrink from the service of their country, but he that stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman."

Thus Mrs. Sandra Boyce, dramatics and speech teacher at John A. Holmes High School began a program that delighted and inspired members and guests at the November meeting of the Edenton Tea Party Chapter DAR. She said that although her opening quotation was an apt description of America at this time, it was written by Thomas Paine as a description of the Revolutionary War. Her talk was appropriate as a bicentennial theme. Mrs. Boyce shared with the members through the oral interpretation of literature some thoughts on the American Revolution a different approach from the historical viewpoint.

From Benjamin Franklin's "Poor Richard Almanac" she gave some of his wise and witty sayings with much expression. Mrs. Boyce gave Patrick Henry's famous "Liberty or Death" speech. The sayings and speeches of Daniel Webster, Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, Lyman Abbott and Thomas Jefferson were well received.

She ended with her thoughts on America today. "I have only

to remind myself that only in America can an individual or group of individuals challenge the Presidency. Only in America do we have the right to speak and publish ideas we choose. I believe as long as we continue to support our freedoms and exercise our rights, everything will turn out for the right in the end."

Mrs. Lloyd Griffin, program chairman presented Mrs. Boyce.

HELPFUL SAFETY TIPS

TIRE CARE TIPS

The salesman was amazed when I told him the exact size and type of new tires I wanted.

He thought women only knew when it was time to buy gas.

If I had told him that I also knew when to rotate the tires and how to read the tire wear gauge indicator, he would have probably gone into shock.

Deciding what type of tire to buy for the car is like deciding what to wear. You won't wear sneakers with a cocktail dress. And you shouldn't mix the types of tires (cross bias, bias belted, radial). Most manufacturers recommend that you buy the same type of tire that came with the car. However, a reputable dealer will be able to recommend other types such as radials, if your driving routine demands them.

The owner's manual is still the best reference source for information on tire buying and care.

But there are simple tests you can give the tires periodically. Such as checking the tires for uneven wear before driving. This will indicate whether the tires are in balance or if you need an alignment job.

Every third gas stop, check the tires' air pressure. Kicking the tires is as undependable as thumping a watermelon.

Remember, your car rides on only four small patches of rubber in contact with the road, so give them the care they need and deserve.
