Are you a cat or a chick who called "Grease", for the show is a recap of life in a high school at the peak of the Fifties - 1959.

It has 15 songs, all new in the '70s, that parody the loud, often harsh, simple, strains of rock'n' roll in its early days. "Several of the tunes" wrote drama critic Dan Sullivan in the Los Angeles Times, "are so good of their kind that they would have been top-tenners if the y'd come out in '59 instead of now. They're instant golden oldies"

The period duplicated in "Grease" was prior to the Rolling Stones and the Beatles, before moonshots and Vietnam, before student dissidents and the campus activists of the midsixties - and that period seems simpler, purer, in retrospect. The mid-60s student activists sneered at students of the Fifties as a "silent generation" but they come alive loud and clear in "Grease", as fizzing as a just-opened Coke.


"Graceful Giving" **Is Baptist Sermon Topic**
