Steve Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Evans, route 3, Edenton, has been selected as the delegate from the Chowan Future Farmers of America Chapter to attend the 1976 Resource Conservation Workshop in Raleigh, June 14-18. The workshop will be held on the campus of N. C. State University.

As the local delegate to the workshop, Steve is being sponsored by Peoples Bank and Trust Company and the Chowan Conservation District Supervisors.

Steve, a rising junior at Chowan High School, has E. S. White, vo-ag teacher at Chowan, as FFA chapter advisor.

According to White, Steve is very active in the FFA program. He is also on the baseball team at Chowan, a member of the Rocky Hock Baptist Church Youth Choir and serves as president of his Sunday School Class.

The workshop, an annual event, is sponsored by the N. C. Chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of America, the N. C. Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission.

According to Lloyd C. Bunch, chairman of the local board of district supervisors, the week-long course is held for high school students and is designed to educate and impress upon a selected group of young men and women the importance of conservation and natural resource development.

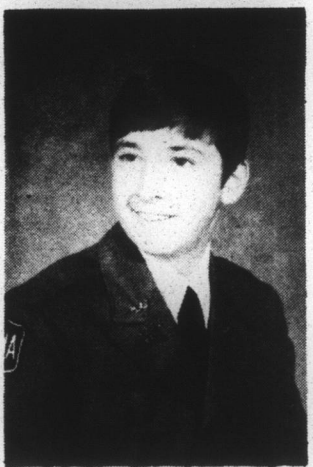
The selected group will study various subjects pertinent to resource

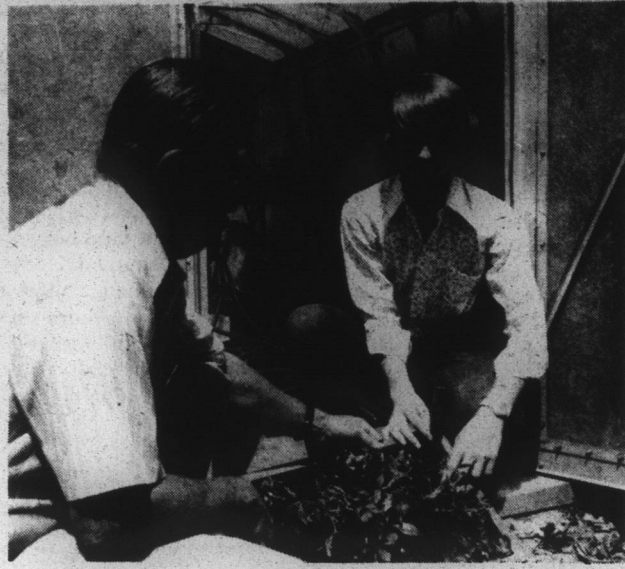
### Ward Is Elected SGA Representative

## Watershed Assistance Is Approved

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Approval for federal assistance for carrying out the Bear Swamp Watershed project in Chowan and Perquimans counties is announced by Rep. Walter B. Jones.

The project, to be carried out in four years, is designed to provide measures for watershed protection, flood

prevention, and agricultural drainage, in the 20,300-acre watershed. It is a local undertaking with Federal assistance under the provisions of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act, Public Law 566, Congressman Jones said.

Project sponsors are the Albemarle Soil and Water Conservation District and the Chowan County Drainage No. 3 in North Carolina. Federal participation for carrying out the locally developed plan will be provided under the direction of Jesse L. Hicks, state conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

With federal funds available, assistance can be provided immediately for accelerating the installation of land treatment measures and preparing final designs and specifications for

structural measures. Some of the land treatment measures already are being applied.

In addition to the conservation land treatment measures necessary to protect and improve the land and water resources of the watershed, the project includes about 17.3 miles of channel work.

Total cost of the project is estimated at \$714,000, of which the federal contribution will be about \$288,000. Local interests will provide about \$426,000 including landrights and will operate and maintain the project when it is completed, Congressman Jones said. The project will return \$1.70 in benefits for every dollar of project costs, he added. Federal assistance will be provided by the Soil Conservation Service and the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

## Martin Returns From Cruise

The USS Independence is currently stationed at the Naval Shipyard, Norfolk, Va. for repairs.

A 1970 graduate of Calvin Coolidge High School in Washington, D. C., he joined the Navy in February, 1975.

Citizens in the coastal counties will have a face-to-face opportunity to offer suggestions or objections about local land-use plans to

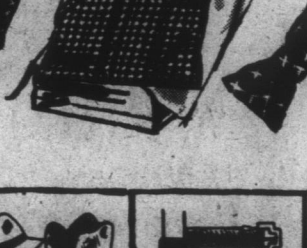
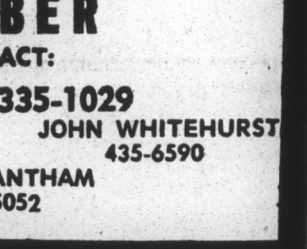
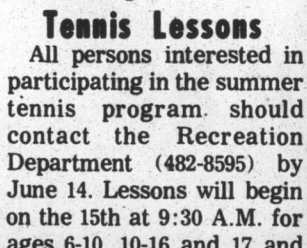
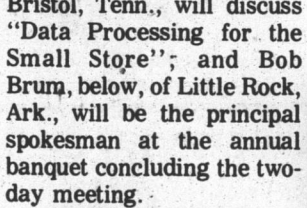
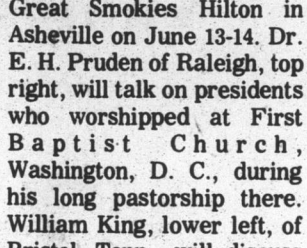
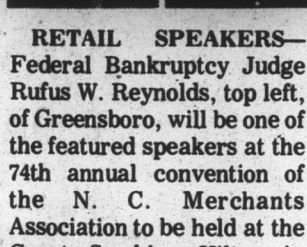
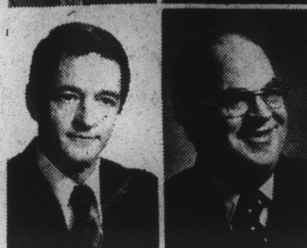
the N. C. Coastal Resources Commission. A morning feedback session has been scheduled for the commission's June 10 meeting at the N. C. Marine Resources Center at Pine Knoll Shores.

The Commission will ask for any opinions or comments that will help them review locally land-use plans. The commission may ask local governments to give further consideration to portions of their plans and resubmit them under the

terms of the Coastal Area Management Act of 1974.

Local governments in the 20 coastal counties and many of the cities and towns have been developing land-use plans for two years.

A land-use plan is a blueprint that states the goals of the people of a community for future growth, and it earmarks the best locations within the community for residential, commercial, industrial, and recreational development during the next 10 years.

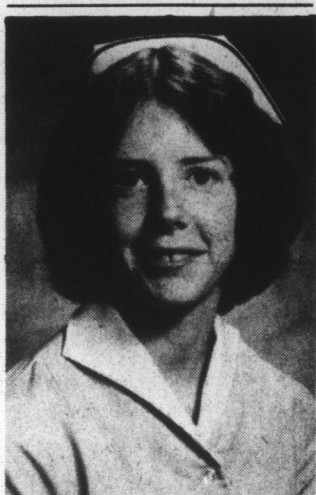

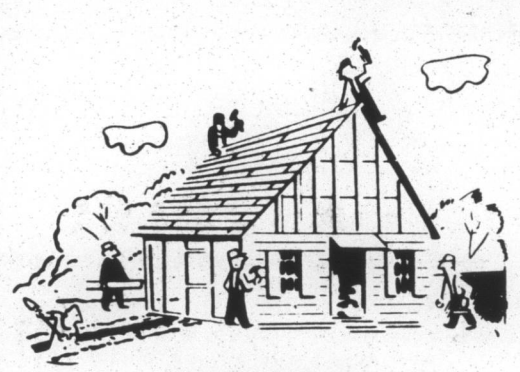
