## Miss McNeill To Marry

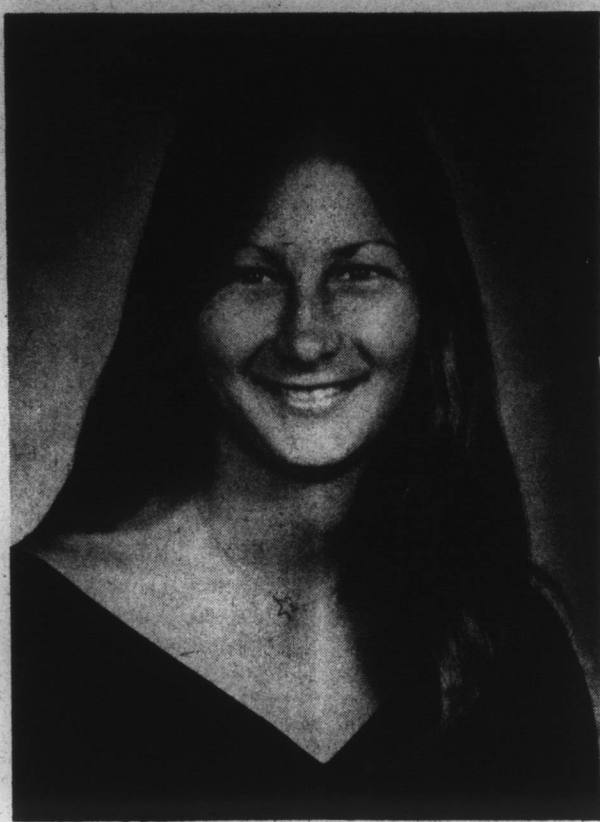
