makes it last a long time." Brady offers these tips: "Most of today's furniture comes with a tag that says the fabric has been coated with Scotch Guard, which is a spray used to protect the fabric from soils and stains. It's like a wax job on your

"However," Brady continued, "the strength of the spray wears out after six months. To compensate, you can buy a can at almost any hardware store for \$2 or less. Then, spray it on the areas you use most -the cushion, the arms and the back, where your head rubs and grease can accumulate. You don't have to spray on the outside.




"Do this every six months," he added. "A can should then last for three full sprays-about a year and a half."

Brady also advises cleaning stains immediately. "If a piece gets soiled from coffee, for instance, wipe it up right away. If you wait, it gets worse.

"Cleaning is very easy. Just mix some dishwashing detergent with warm water and make heaps of suds. Then, using the top layers of suds, clean the area thoroughly with a bristled brush. After it dries, apply a fresh coat of Scotch Guard."

Spraying and cleaning up stains right away can increase the wear of your furniture by 100 per cent, Brady said.
