

I-95 Dedications Set November 21

RALEIGH — Gov. Jim Hunt will participate in dedication ceremonies marking the formal opening of Interstate 95 from Kenly to Gold Rock.

The I-95 project is the longest and most costly segment of highway to be opened at one time in the state's history. The total cost of the 38.1-million corridor is approximately \$81.6-million.

Four simultaneous ribbon-cutting ceremonies on I-95 will be held near Gold Rock, Rocky Mount, Wilson and Rocky Ridge at 10 A.M., November 21.

The I-95 project is a year ahead of its original completion date, according to State Secretary of Transportation Tom Bradshaw. "The early completion of

this vital link of Interstate 95 reflects the governor's commitment to finish construction and open the state's major north-south corridors as quickly as possible," Sec. Bradshaw said.

"The tie-in of this north-south highway with such major east-west connectors as U.S.-64 and 264 is an important step in the Hunt Administration's efforts to promote balanced economic growth across the state," he noted.

"We appreciate the cooperative efforts of Barnhill Contracting Company, Inc., Nello L. Teer Inc., Lane Construction Company, Prismo Universal Corporation and S.T. Wooten

Construction Company in working to speed up construction and complete this project in time for the Thanksgiving holidays," Sec. Bradshaw said.

Both the Gov. and Sec. Bradshaw will participate in a ribbon-cutting ceremony on the northbound lane at the I-95-NC-42 interchange near Rock Ridge.

Board of Transportation members Marc Basnight of Manteo and T.G. "Sonny Boy" Joyner of Garysburg will officiate at the ribbon-cutting ceremony at the I-95 - I-95 Business Loop interchange near Gold Rock.

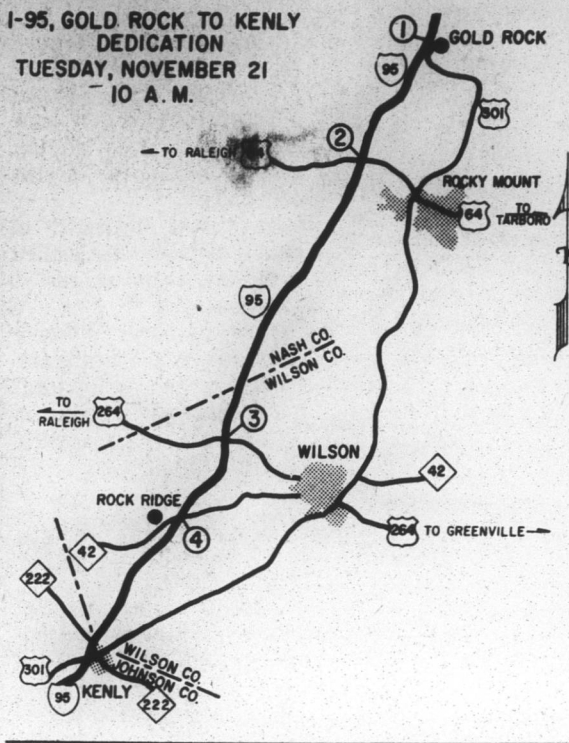
Dr. Moses A. Ray of Tarboro, also a member of the board, will dedicate the highway at the I-95 - U.S.-64 interchange near Rocky Mount.

Another board member, William C. Herring of Wilson, will cut the ribbon at the I-95 - U.S.-264 interchange near Wilson. Other state and local officials are also expected to be on hand at each dedication site.

I-95 extends from Maine to Miami, Florida. The opening of this corridor will allow motorists to travel on the interstate through North Carolina, except for the uncompleted 17-mile Fayetteville Bypass, which is scheduled to be finished in late 1980.

The public is invited to attend the dedication ceremonies. The highway will be opened to traffic immediately after the brief ceremonies.

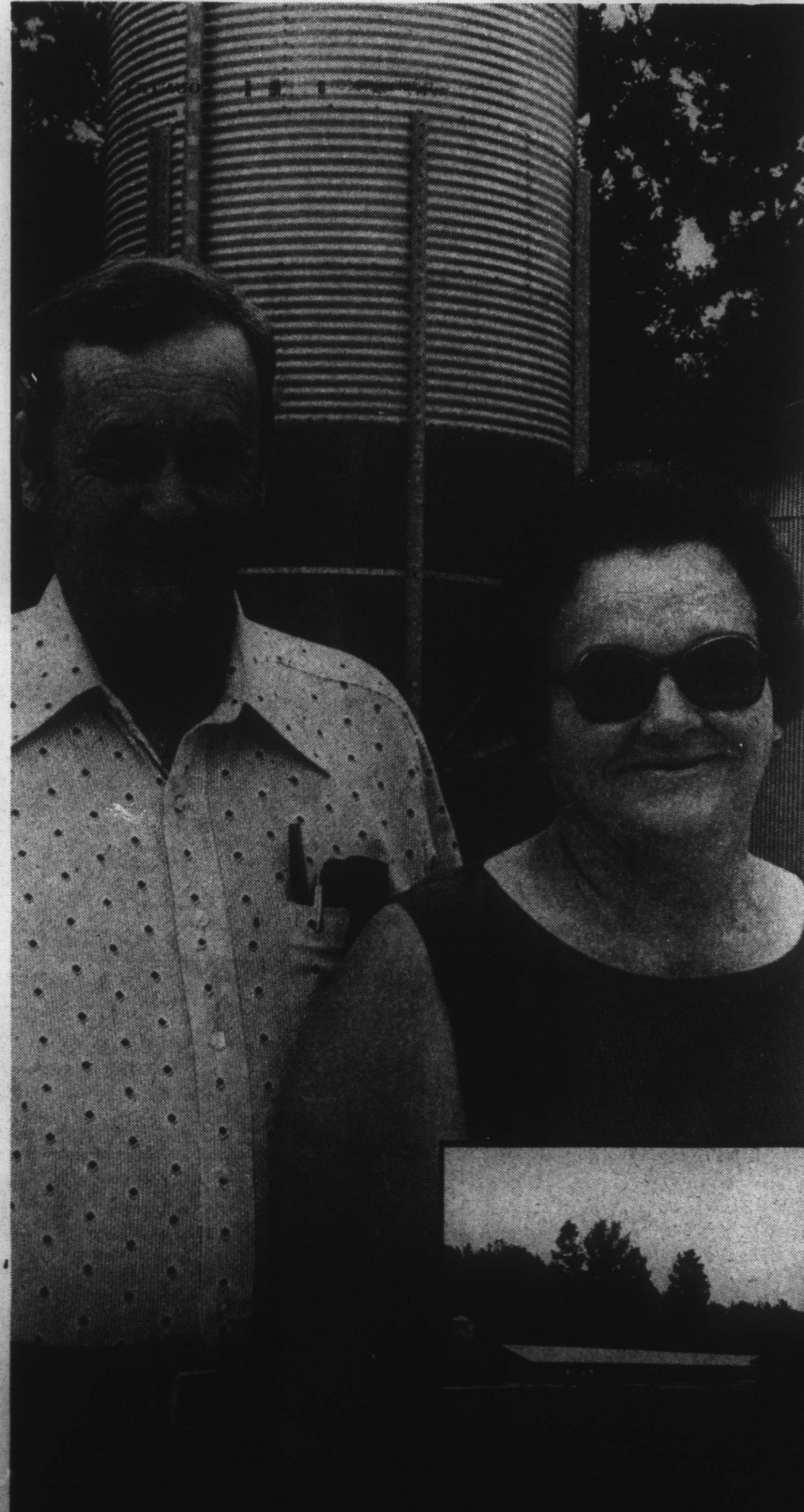
Ervina K. Copeland, Route 1, Tyner, is teaching the First Grade at Pactolus Elementary School.
