Southeastern Section — Trading of peanuts grown in the Southeast was fairly slow. Prices were slightly higher for jumbo and firm for other grades. Reaction to the 1980 peanut crop support levels was varied, with many mills holding back offerings for a while. The snow storm in the Virginia-North Carolina area limited trading somewhat since several dealers work out of that area. There was some interest in new crop trading but no sales were reported. There were few sales.

Mrs. Scott To Campaign

Former North Carolina first lady Jessie Rae Scott will officially hit the campaign trail in her husband's behalf Tuesday in Williamston, where she will represent former Gov. Bob Scott at a Democratic fund raiser.

Scott, who served as governor of North Carolina from 1969-1973, will oppose incumbent Gov. Jim Hunt in the Democratic Primary on May 6.

Mrs. Scott will attend the Martin County spring Democratic Gala to be held in the Williamston High School cafeteria. Attorney General Rufus Edmisten will be the keynote speaker at the 7 P.M. barbecue dinner.

The appearance by Mrs. Scott is her first official campaign function since Scott announced in November that he would run for governor.

"My husband is doing a great service to the people of North Carolina, and to the Democratic Party, by challenging the present administration, and I want to be a part of the challenge," Mrs. Scott said. "I plan to become as actively involved in his campaign as my schedule at home will allow."

Mrs. Scott said she will travel across the state during the next three months to represent Scott at political functions he is unable to attend.

Virginia-North Carolina Section — Trading of peanuts grown in Virginia and North Carolina was slow. Demand was fairly good. Prices were higher for Fancy and firm for other grades. A heavy snow storm on Wednesday forced several mills to close and limited trading on Thursday. The earlier announcement of the 1980 crop support prices caused many in the industry to adopt a wait-and-see attitude. Supplies were light and several mills had only a few grades to offer. Sales were primarily limited to prompt shipment. There were few sales. Prices paid per pound for Virginia type peanuts sold on an FOB shipping point basis for prompt shipment unless otherwise

stated were for unshelled Fancy 37½ cents, early sales 37, February 37½ to 38, March to May 38½, occasional higher; shelled extra large few 50, for export occasional 53 to 54; medium few 39½; number one few 35; number one with splits few 35; number two with 60 per cent splits 32½ to 33; with 70 per cent splits 33 to 33½ mostly 33½, February shipment 33½ to 34, March to May 34½.

Southwestern Section — Trading of peanuts grown in the Southwest was slow. Demand was fairly light. Prices were unchanged. Several mills temporarily held back offerings because of the price support announcement. Inclement weather and higher freight costs (to the east) limited movement somewhat. Prices paid per pound for Southwestern grown peanuts sold on an FOB shipping points basis for prompt shipment unless otherwise stated were for shelled Spanish type number one few 38½, occasional 38¼, April 38¼; U.S. splits occasional 36; runner type jumbo 36, medium February 35 to 35½; number one 34½ to 34¾; US splits-35 to 35½; 14-16s 25; unshelled Valencia type handpicked 36 to 37, mid-February 37.

Practice made perfect for six John A. Holmes High School Band members who, because of their talent, ambition and dedication, became members of the Eastern Division's All State Band. Steve Lane, Graham Cox, Bonner Litchfield, Lynn Dale, David Hibbard and Alan Parker appeared in All State Band performances at East Carolina University's Wright Auditorium on February 9 following auditions in competition with 410 students from 41 eastern district schools for the honors.

During the eastern All State Band Festival, approximately two-hundred selected students were divided, from skills displayed during previous auditions, into the Symphonic and the Concert bands for giving two separate performances. Steve Lane, alto clarinet, had the distinction of winning 2nd chair in the Symphonic Band. Graham Cox and Bonner Litchfield also placed in this coveted division.

Alan Parker, trombonist, won first chair in the Concert Band. Lynn Dale and David Hibbard were also Concert Band participants.

School Registration Underway

Only 150 finalists, plus alternates, will be selected from the field of applicants for the School's first eleventh grade class of the 1980-81 school year. State and federal agencies provide financial support for the school, making tuition, room and board free to all North Carolina students accepted.

Students selected for the School will be challenged by a curriculum which will stretch their capacity to learn to its limits. The faculty will be supplemented by outside, highly skilled individuals and consultants from industry, nearby universities and the scientific and cultural institutions in the Research Triangle area.

Any interested tenth grade student who can meet the school's specified criteria is eligible for nomination. Nomination forms may be secured in the Guidance office at Chowan and Holmes schools. All students nominated will be required to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test on March 22, 1980. Deadline to register for the SAT is February 15, 1980. Registration for the SAT needs to be done immediately with the high school guidance counselors.

Nurses Asst. Class Is Scheduled

Chowan Hospital in Edenton will be the location for a Nurses' Assistant course which will begin on Monday, March 3. The 11-week course has been scheduled as a cooperative effort between the hospital and College of The Albemarle.

Claire Mills, R.N., staff development coordinator, said the objectives of the training are to prepare qualified men and women to provide basic nursing care to selective patients, to make and report observations, and to conduct routine aspects of unit management.

Elaine Gibson, R.N., will be the instructor for the class. Classes will meet six hours daily, Monday through Friday, from 8 A.M. until 3 P.M. in the hospital's auditorium.

Mrs. Mills said the classroom instruction will focus on basic nursing procedures that are related to the needs of patients. Common therapeutic measures also will be taught.

"A wide variety of clinical experience at Chowan Hospital will provide opportunities for students to apply the knowledge they have gained in the classroom to actual hospital practice," the coordinator explained.
