## Special Program For Senior Citizens

Elderhostel combines the venture of hosteling with pursuit of knowledge o an exciting educational ogram. Each of the twelve ticipating campuses in orth Carolina will offer a ries of week-long, noncredit college level courses. There are no exams, no grades, no required homework - just the fun of arning. Participants need ot be college graduates. Some of the most enthusiastic people in former Elderhostel classes were not ble for economic of family reasons to complete their formal education. An adventuresome spirit is all

that is needed to participate. Participants will be housed in campus dormitory facilities, and dining will be in campus dining halls. Elderhostel is offered at no profit by the participating schools. Fees will be \$130 per week per person. A number of scholarships are available. Eligibility is based on financial need. Full scholarships are available to individuals with a single income of \$4,250.00 or less and to couples with an income of \$5,625 of less.

If you are 60 or over, or have a friend, parent, or grandparent 60 or over, then a unique educational program called Elderhostel is available to you and other elder citizens this summer of 12 colleges and universities throughout North Carolina.

Elderhostel combines the adventure of hosteling with the pursuit of knowledge into an exciting week of educational activities. Started in New Hampshire n 1975, the program now includes schools in every

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state of the Union. Campuses making up the North Carolina network of Elderhostel include: Appalachian State University, Mars Hill College, UNC-Asheville, UNC-Chapel Hill, UNC-Charlotte, UNC-Greensboro, UNC-Wilmington, Western Carolina University, Winston-Salem State University, Campbell University, Wingate College and Warren Wilson College.

During the summer each school will offer a series of week long, non-credit college level courses taught by regular faculty members. There will be no exams, no grades, and no required reading. Included are such subjects as: The American Civil War; Recreational Theatre; Rare and Endangered Species of

Sailors, Ships and the Sea; and Einstein, The Man and His Legacy, to name just a few. The fee for one week, which includes tuition, campus housing and dining will be \$130.00 for all participants. Scholarships are available to persons in need of financial assistance.

In addition to courses each campus offers a wide variety of extra-curricular activities such as concerts, plays, music programs, nature hikes, together with recreational sports such as golf, tennis, and swimming.






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
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
