Mailbox Improvement Week

Among the many things that springtime brings to mind is spring cleaning, and Postmaster James M. Bond has a reminder to include your mailbox in this annual spring rite.

Mailbox Improvement Week, May 18-23, provides the perfect opportunity to clean, repair, repaint or replace your mailbox.

"Neat, attractive mailboxes add to the overall appearance of the community and aid in the delivery of mail," the Postmaster said.

Boxes should be within easy reach for letter carriers. On rural routes, the carrier must have access to the box without leaving his vehicle. Mailboxes on rural and contract routes must be located on the right hand side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier, the Postmaster said.

"Rain or snow leaking into the mailbox could ruin the special letter; so box seams should be tight to prevent the loss or damage of mail placed in the box," he said.

Box numbers and house numbers should be clearly visible on the box, but including the owner's name is optional.

All mailboxes, must meet certain requirements for size, strength, safety and location. These guidelines are available from the local post office, Postmaster Bond said.

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Continued From Page 1-B cents per gallon tax. The final package, of course, includes a three cents per gallon tax hike.

In spite of the governor's statement that he was "guided in large measure by their (the commission) thorough and expert findings the governor's final package resembles not at all the three alternatives of the Blue Ribbon Commission. Instead, the governor's team began looking at solutions not for practicality but for compromise. Not for neatness but for successful passage.

"Sure, its a complicated solution, owing basically to compromise—but we had to make it palatable to the people and to the legislature. Even the governor says its a temporary solution, but its the best we can get through the legislature," Pearce says. Virtually all of the major

program points originated outside the inner circle.

The first outside suggestion, an alcohol tax increase, came from Senator George Marion.

Conrad Duncan, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, suggested the transfer of auto accessories tax revenue.

Apparently, the mining severance tax idea came straight from an article in the Raleigh News and Observer.

Then, the Thursday and Friday before Hunt's Monday night tax speech, Sen. Ken Royal's tax rebate idea was incorporated.

Changes in the text of Monday night's speech were made on into Monday afternoon when the final text was being printed and fed into the teleprinter.
