

# Scientists Set Priority Study

RALEIGH - William V. Griffin of New Bern, vice president of the National Corn Growers Association and a current member of the Board of Directors of the Corn Growers Association of North Carolina, recently announced that several research scientists of the **Department of Crop Science** at North Carolina State University will be involved in a "National Corn Research Needs and Priorities Study."

Griffin said that the purpose of the study is "to determine whether or not a 10-billion bushel U.S. corn crop is a practical goal in order to meet the nation's domestic and export needs."

Griffin, is being financed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture through its cooperating research agencies

"Task forces on production, utilization and marketing have been organized to conduct the study," Griffin stated, "by a National Corn Research Coordinating Committee."

In the North Carolina phase of the study, the USDA and the Agriculture Research Service of NCSU will be jointly involved. The USDA will provide funding, while the Department of crop Science of NCSU will provide research and faculty personnel. Dr. Paul Harvey and Dr. Billy Caldwell, crop scientists at NCSU, will handle overall coordination of the study.
