Ducks Unlimited Organization Raises \$1-milli

The North Carolina Ducks seven of our 50 states, North Unlimited organization has joined a very small group of other states that raised more than a million dollars in one year for the national organization. In 1979, only six of the 50 states reached that sum. In 1980, North Carolina joined those six states. North Carolina is the only state on the Atlantic seaboard to attain the million dollar plateau. The other six states are California, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, Texas, and Minnesota.

Stuart R. Paine, outgoing North Carolina State Chairman of D. U. notes, "In 1980 North Carolina raised exactly one million dollars more than it realized in the first year of the 1970s decade, when in 1970 it. raised \$33,000. In 1980, North Carolina raised \$1,033,000. We raised \$200.000 more in the first year of the 80s than was raised in the first six vears of the 1970s. Also, of this very small number of


