Dove Hunters Are Warned

Now that dove hunting season is underway in North Carolina, Carolina Telephone again reminds hunters to use good judgement and not shoot at birds perched on telephone wires or cables.

Direct hits and even grazing shots have resulted in the disruption of telephone service for some customers according to T. F. Daniels, district commercial and marketing manager for Carolina Telephone.

Since aerial cables are rarely actually shot down. he pointed out, cables damaged by shots are much more difficult to locate and repair than lines actually knocked down, for example by falling tree limbs or auto accidents.
