Carolina Telephone's 1982 Tax Payment Is Explained

Carolina Telephone's 1982 Edenton tax payment here amounted to \$11,655.02.

T.F. Daniels, Carolina Telephone's district commercial and marketing manager in Elizabeth City said that the company's total tax payment within Chowan County including all city taxes is \$40,683.05.

County and municipal 1982 taxes paid by the company in its 50-county operating area totaled nearly \$8-million.

"The taxes reflect Carolina Telephone's extensive investment in buildings and equipment to provide telephone service to some 580,000 customers," said Daniels.

Carolina Telephone's total tax bill for 1982, including all state and federal taxes, is expected to come to nearly

\$63.7-million.

This figure does not include more than \$2.8 million in one per cent federal excise tax payments which were billed in 1982 to telephone users by the company.

"Carolina Telephone has more than \$1-billion invested in its service area. Each year the company must invest millions of dollars in new equipment and facilities to keep pace with rapidly changing technology and to meet the communication needs of Eastern North Carolina," said T. F. Daniels.

"In recent years, our construction programs have been costing us about \$100-million annually. Of this \$100-million spent each year, about half goes to maintain and replace existing equipment. The remaining dollars are being

used to modernize and upgrade our facilities."

The company has applied for a general rate increase which would increase its local service revenues by approximately \$34-million annually. Should the North Carolina Utilities Commission approve the request, federal and state taxes would take a little more than half of the requested revenues.

Drifting Teeth

After you've had a tooth extracted, you may think your other teeth will stay right where they are, but that's not likely to happen. As soon as a gap is created in your mouth, the outer teeth are prone to drifting, especially the teeth closest to the gap. This can cause serious dental problems, including eventual loss of teeth.

When you have a missing tooth, there is a natural tendency for the teeth on either side of the gap to drift toward each other. This may happen so slowly and imperceptively that you don't realize it's happening at first. With the drifting, open contact areas are created where food will collect, causing tooth decay. This can cause gum infection and bone loss problems.

The drifting also throws your other teeth out of alignment, resulting in malocclusion or improper bite. This will decrease your chewing efficiency and put abnormal strain on your remaining teeth. Sometimes this results in jaw pain. If you have a missing tooth, you should ask your dentist what he would recommend to replace it.
