50,000 DUI Arrests

RALEIGH - Heman R. Clark, secretary of the N.C. **Department of Crime Control** and Public Safety, announced that preliminary figues show the State Highway Patrol made more than 50,000 DUI arrests in 1982 while traffic fatalities dropped by 199 com-

pared to 1981. "To date," Clark said, "the patrol has recorded 50,640 DUI arrests in 1982 and that may go even higher with late reports coming in. There were 1,298 traffic fatalities in 1982-a drop of 199 when com-

pared to the 1,497 in 1981. "This is the second largest drop in traffic fatalities from one year to the next since 1943 when the speed limit was 35 miles per hour, gas and tires were rationed and there were






