Repairing Fractured Tooth

If you have a fractured tooth, whether chipped or broken, this not only detracts from your appearance, it also can make the tooth more rulnerable to decay. It, should be repaired as soon as possible.

In one repair method, the dentist may use a composite resin in an acid etch process. The chipped or broken tooth will first be cleaned with pumice and a revolving rubber wheel. Then he'll apply a dilute acid to the surface of the tooth so the comsite resin will adhere to t. After the correct shade as been selected, he will shape the resin directly onto the fractured area. n a few minutes it will

harden, and then the dentist will give the repaired area its final shaping and Other repair methods

may be used, depending on the condition of the tooth, but often composite resin will be selected because it had a superior bonding quality and is relatively inexpensive. It also has a "time" advantage, because the repair can often be completed in one visit.
