Assembly Held

More than 1,400 Jehovah's Witnesses and friends met this past weekend at the Williamston High School auditorium for their annual Circuit Assembly. The two-day program was designed to heighten their appreciation for the values found in the holy scriptures. The program allows participants to purchase various types of clothes, shoes, toys, hats and some household items.

Clothing for the closet is donated and donors will be given a receipt for tax purposes, on request. Clothing is sorted, priced and sold, with money received used for other emergency needs in Chowan County. Clothing is accepted "as is" unless extremely soiled.

The churches that sponsor the project are Edenton Baptist, Edenton United Methodist, St. Ann's Catholic, St. Paul's Episcopal, Albemarle Baptist, First Assembly of God and First Presbyterian.

The store is governed by a board, with two members from each church serving as volunteers.
