



Doing The Buyer's Homework!

When it's time to sell your home, you may consider selling on your own, without the help of a real estate agent. If so, there's some "home" work you'll probably need to do for your buyers.

Why? Because, one of the first questions buyers ask a real estate agent is "How much cash do I need to purchase this home?", and "How much will my monthly payments be?"

The cash requirements to purchase your home will depend on the type financing chosen by the buyers. For example, if financing is available on 75% of the purchase price, the down payment would be 25%. The monthly payment would depend on the amount borrowed, the interest rate, and the term of the loan. This figure can be found by using an amortization book. In addition to the monthly payment for principal and interest, add additional amounts for taxes and insurance.
